Cavemen Turn Magician; Hunters Spin Prize Yarn

Houdini himself couldn't have hidden the pigskin better than the Grants Pass Cavemen Friday night when they pulled the nearest deceptive play of the season against the Pelicans and scored from the center stripe.

It caught the Klamath team so completely off guard that the whole outfit was sucked well over to the opposite side of the scrimmage line when Newman, Caveman back, emerged from a dog-pile and skittered left end on his 50-yard touchdown jaunt.

It looked like the play originated by Larry Wolf when he was coach at Monmouth. On this maneuver the center switched the ball between the legs of the guard next to him, and the linesman covered him up in the Grants Pass version the ball was given to Newman, who waited until a clear field lay before him, then skittered the Klamath safety for an easy score.

Monmouth made use of the trick twice in the same game against Oregon one year to score two touchdowns and give the Webfoots the scare of their lives. Soon after, Oregon State played Monmouth and reversed the situation, scoring a touchdown with the same play.

Grants Pass played better ball than had been anticipated, evidently gaining confidence after outwitting the second stringers in the first quarter. After that the regulars had the best of it, but were not up to par. According to members of the Pelican crew, the Cavemen were hitting harder than Medford.

Out of this year's crop of deer hunting yarns one prize-winner stands far above all others: (The tellers swear to its truth.)

The deer came up to the tree and stopped. Shaddock again waved his hat. The deer thrust his head through the crotch and the hunterman grabbed it by the horns. Then he took his knife and cut its throat.

The buck had been wounded just above the knee joint of one back leg.

CAVEMEN USE HIDDEN BALL PLAY, LOSE BY 12 TO 7

Using a hidden ball play which netted a touchdown after a surprising 50-yard run, the Grants Pass Cavemen last night crowded the unbeaten Klamath Falls Pelicans in a conference game on Modoc field but the locals held a previous two-touchdown lead to win 12-7.

Grants Pass kept the oft-tied Pelicans scoreless in the first half, despite the fact that Snowy Gustafson replaced his second string starters with his regulars at the end of the first quarter. The Pelicans opened with a powerful 50-yard march early in the third period to score their first touchdown. They crossed the goal line again late in the third period after a 25-yard pass placed the ball on the Grants Pass four-yard line. Both tries for the extra point were unsuccessful.

It was midway in the last period that Grants Pass caught the Pelicans flat-footed with a bit of deception that worked like a charm. With the ball resting on the mid-stripe, a Grants Pass backfield man faked for a pass, sucking would-be Pelican tacklers well into the Caveman backfield. The ball, in the meantime, had been slipped from the Grants Pass center to the left guard and was kept under a heap of Grants Pass players on the line.

Then Newman, fleet left half, emerged from the pileup into a clear field and raced over the goal line standing up. The Cavemen plunged through the line for the extra point.

With the Pelican first stringers on the bench as the game opened, Grants Pass slashed through the Klamath Falls reserves for long gains and dominated the first quarter.

The Pelicans kicked off and the Cavemen started the game with two successive first downs, the first on a quarterback sneak and the second on a pass from Davis to Clark. On the third down Davis again passed, this time to Nelson, but the gain was short of a first down.

After an exchange of punts in which the longest kicking was done by Grants Pass, Christiansen, reserve left half for the Pelicans, started a drive which carried the ball 35 yards. He charged through the line for a first down, picked up five more and then reeled off another first down on an off-tackle run. The threat ended on the Grants Pass 30-yard line at the close of the first quarter when a Caveman intercepted Ramo's pass.

Ramos and Love, who started the game, remained on the field as Snowy sent in his regulars. Rush smashed over left tackle for nine yards and Anacker got away for 14 on an end sweep. After another first down by Anacker the power attack bogged down and the Pelicans took to the air with a long pass from Anacker to Webster for another first down.

WILDCATS TIE LAKEVIEW TO END SEASON UNDEFEATED

The Klamath Union high school Wildcats finished their season undefeated by tying Lakeview 6-6 at Lakeview Friday night.

The Wildcat touchdown came in the first play of the game when Fullback Virgil Jarret took the ball through the center of the line on a pile driver play and galloped 50 yards through a field of mud for a touchdown. Lakeview tied the game in the third quarter when the Lake county eleven marched the length of the field in five plays.

The game was one of the most exciting played by the Cats this year with both ball clubs turning in a creditable performance. Although Klamath dominated the first quarter, the second and fourth quarters were Lakeview's, with the third quarter seeing both clubs threatening their opponents' goal. At the beginning of the third quarter the Cats rifled a pass over the Lakeview goal line, but the referee declared both sides off side and the play was called back. The Cats then tried for a field goal but failed.

During the last part of the third quarter Lee Morris, Lakeview fullback, carried the ball from his 30 to the Klamath 30 and in three plays the ball was pushed over by Dollahide, left half.

The Lakeview team made the most first downs and the most yardage by scrimmage, but the Klamath team made more yardage through passes.

Melvin Harren, left end, Rollo Cheyne, left half, and Jarret, fullback, played outstanding ball for Klamath with Dollahide shining on the Lakeview team.

The play that scored for the Wildcats surprised the spectators a little in that it was the same play the team had been practicing for 15 minutes before the grandstand.

Lakeview's main trouble during the game proved to be Melvin Harren, Klamath left end who played most of the evening in the Honker backfield, smearing plays and stripping the interference from around Lakeview's super-speedster, Dollahide.

Dollahide, however, turned in plenty of yardage on punt returns and runs from fake punt formations, from which he managed to elude most of the Wildcats, including Harren.

The Harren-Dollahide battle climaxed in the second quarter when Dollahide kicked out of bounds on the Wildcat one-yard line and then ran the Klamath step back to the 20. Harren then stepped in and stopped the Lakeview threat by smearing the next four plays. Harren was credited with throwing 16 Honker plays for losses in the first half.

Willamette U. Finds Stride

Willamette university hit its stride at Tacoma Friday night, trouncing the College of Puget Sound, 42 to 6, and stepping squarely into the limelight of the Northwest Collegiate Football conference race.

The Salem team, defending its co-championship in the league, scored two touchdowns in each of the first three quarters to demonstrate power not shown in its disastrous pre-conference game at Tacoma. Walden and Gillin, sub Henry Bennett and End Hob Linman carried the ball over the line, Willamette mixed running attacks, passes and fine defensive play to demoralize the Puget Sound scoring plan.

The single Puget Sound score was made on a pass from Bert McLoughlin to Bill Madden in the fourth period.

Other college games, all non-conference affairs, held close to form. Western Washington beat down St. Martin's 12 to 9, at Olympia, with Quarterback Ray Paglia demonstrating to big brother (and St. Martin's coach) Joe Paglia just how quarterbacking should be done.

Lewiston normal players got rid of two-week-old boards by defeating Whitworth, 14 to 7, thus fulfilling their pledge to find a football victory before shaving.

Eastern Oregon normal sprang a surprise by adding another to Pacific university's string of defeats. The score was 6-0. The normal scored in the first minute of play with a pass from its own ten yard line and held five Pacific drives short of the goal to protect the lead.
