ANNIVERSARY OF MERRILL PAIR OBSERVED

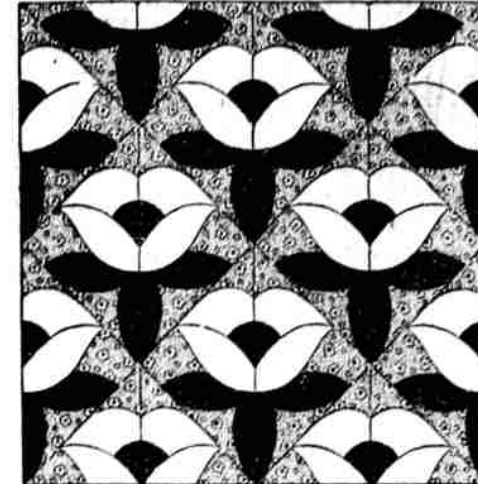
