The overhead crossing on the Weed-Klamath highway at Weed, a \$50,000 job, is in danger in the California special election November 7, according to word received here from the California department of public works. Warning that this and several other Siskiyou projects would be delayed or eliminated by passage of the "ham and eggs" pension scheme was issued by the California department.

The federal government has notified the state of California that no federal match funds for road work will be available unless California puts up cash for its share. Ham and eggs stamp scrip will not be accepted. Contractors have notified the state that they will quit work immediately if scrip is tendered in place of cash. The Weed overpass is on the major highway construction schedule.
