## BUYING FAILS TO TOUCH OFF STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (AP)—Rallying fuel was plentiful in the stock market today but the buying ignition, except on rare occasions, failed to spark.

Oils, aircraft, steel and specialties got mild late support and numerous issues kept declines to inconsequential fractions. Steels tried for a rise at the start, then backed away only to recover at the end. Motors and rails were feeble throughout.

The list moped on the get-away, but picked up some volume on a selling flurry around mid-day. Offerings dwindled from then on, along with activity, and transfers for the full proceedings were in the neighborhood of \$60,000 shares.

Business news still had a boom-time tinge, but an assortment of traders inclined to stand aside as doubts began to blossom regarding a possible "correction" in the upward industrial sweep which has pushed operations in many lines to within the vicinity of capacity. Earnings statements, boosted dividends and "extras" were encouraging but seemingly without a great deal of motivating power marketwise.

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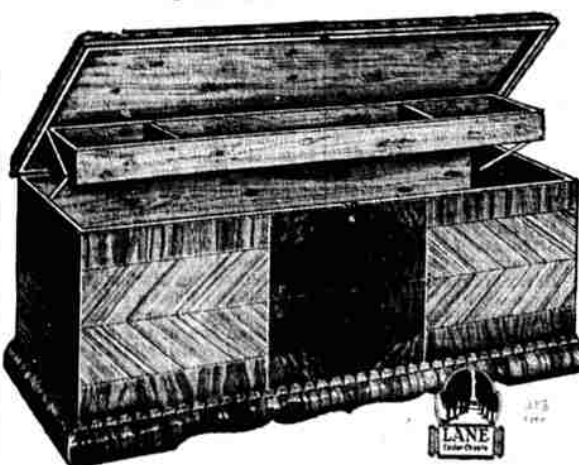
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
