

RAILROAD HEAD RESIGNS OFFICE

Arthur Curtiss James, whose railroad interests have brought him frequently to Klamath Falls, on Monday resigned as chairman of the board and a director of the Western Pacific railroad company. The board accepted the resignation, effective December 31.

James explained that he is not disposing of any part of his investment in the Western Pacific, but is resigning from a number of such positions to lighten the burden of his business activities. The bewhiskered railroad investor served on the Western Pacific board for 12 years.

His announcement recalls for many Klamath people the brief, wintry day in November, 1931, when James drove the golden spike that connected the Western Pacific with the Great Northern at Bieher. His remarks on that occasion, and many others, bespoke his interest in the development of the west by western railroads.

James is reputed the largest individual owner of railroad stocks in the world.

SUMMIT LODGE WILL HAVE NEW LIGHTING PLANT

CASCADE SUMMIT — Lowell L. Hall, manager of Summit lodge, is installing a hydro-electric plant for the purpose of electrifying the lodge. The plant is being constructed by Roy Temple and water will be taken from Trapper creek through a flume for a distance of about 1500 feet, where a drop of 20 feet will furnish the power to operate the plant. Hall expects to have the plant in operation by the last of the month.

CONCRETE WORK DISCONTINUED AT S. P. LINE TUNNEL

CASCADE SUMMIT — The concreting of the barrel of tunnel number three on the Southern Pacific has been discontinued for this year. Seventeen hundred and eighty five feet were concreted this summer, leaving 700 to be concreted next summer. This tunnel is 3625 feet long and concreting has been done in it for the past six years, but will be completed next year.

Approximately 55 men were employed on this project under F. E. Decker and L. J. Tuller. Decker was moved to Cruzatte where he is making preparations to concrete tunnels in that vicinity.
