

NAZIS MOURN FOR DEAD IN BEER CELLAR

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declared. "He has been given to us anew. Tears of joy have been shed all over Germany at this miracle of preservation from harm. Providence will continue to keep the Fuehrer for us."

He said that "providence ever has been with the Fuehrer, and added:

"Just as the Burgerbrau crime rebounded to the Fuehrer's boon, so the great crime—namely the war that has been forced upon us—will rebound to his and Germany's boon."

"Germany's victory will hinder the enemies of peace who continue to incite the peoples to war. Victory will be ours, thanks to the dead."

The services came during a lull in operations on the war front. A communique issued this morning by the high command said:

"The war relapsed into comparative inactivity. In the west there was only minor scouting and artillery activity. One French captive balloon was brought down at Kolmar by a German pursuit plane."

A commission investigating Burgerbrau explosion, in which 68 persons were injured, announced it had uncovered "positive" evidence that parts used in construction of the informal machine causing the blast were of foreign origin."

BERLIN, Nov. 11 (UP)—Fragments of the time-bomb used in the attempted assassination of Chancellor Adolf Hitler at Munich Wednesday night have been recovered from the ruins of the Burgerbrau beer cellar and "actually trace the crime to a foreign country," it was announced today.

The official German news agency, which made the announcement, said investigators of the Nazi Gestapo working under Heinrich Himmler had been rewarded after a thorough sifting of the beer cellar debris.

"It can be said an examination of the origin of certain parts of the time-bomb used in the Burgerbrau cellar explosion actually makes the crime traceable to a foreign country," the official D. N. B. agency said.

The fragments of the time-bomb were found deep in the 10-foot deep debris of the beer cellar, it was said, and experts are making a microscopic examination of them.

"It may be said as far as the composition of certain parts of the metal (of the bomb) are concerned it will actually be possible to prove foreign origin," the announcement continued.

"Several investigations are being carried on at present independently of each other in order to obtain an absolutely indisputable result."

CONVICT GIVEN DEATH SENTENCE

pled demand of Prosecutor Smith Troy, who had exhorted the jurors to "show the same kind of mercy to these men that they showed to their victim."

Mrs. Roloff had testified the pair abducted her in her own automobile the night of Oct. 8, forcing her to drive them to a shack on an abandoned farm near Tenino and to submit to attack. Both were charged with first degree kidnapping under the state's so-called Lindbergh law.

The conviction was the third within two years Troy had won on similar charges. Previously, he had succeeded in having Marjorie Latus convicted of kidnapping an Olympia taxi-driver and in having Dr. Kent W. Berry, Robert Smith, James Reddick and William McAlone convicted on the same charge for the torture-abduction of Irving Baker, Olympia automobile dealer.

Marable, however, was the first of the seven defendants to receive a death sentence recommendation.

Both men listened to the verdict without visible emotion last night. Their attorneys announced they would appeal.

Marable had pleaded that he was so drunk on the night of the abduction that he was unable to remember his actions. Leonard Top, attorney for Kimmich, described the youth as the product of sordid home conditions and a victim of his environment. He denied that the crime constituted kidnapping.

Two Headed Baby "Doing Nicely" As One Removed

KINGSPORT, Tenn., Nov. 11 (AP)—A baby boy born October 17 with two heads, one of which was later removed, is "coming along nicely" and may develop into a normal youngster, Dr. J. C. Statzer, Bristol, Tenn., physician reported today.

Dr. Statzer said the baby weighed nine pounds at birth and had a second, abnormal head at the base of the normal head.

"It had the outline of a head with eyes, nose, mouth and hair but no ears," the physician declared.

Dr. Statzer, with a record of 3500 deliveries in 35 years of practice, asserted he could not recall a similar case in medical history. He said he had made a careful study of the case before performing the operation.

The physician reported he first amputated the abnormal head and several days later removed the neck, leaving a small wound. He expressed the opinion hair would grow over the scar, eventually making it unnoticeable.

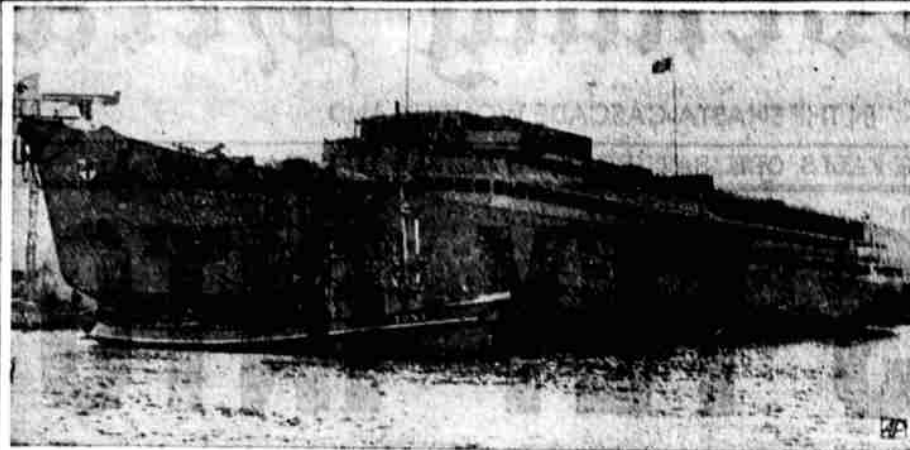
A British army surgeon wrote "Yankee Doodle," which was used as a marching song by the colonists during the Revolutionary war.

LOWLAND AREA EYES DEFENSE ALONG BORDER

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Germany took any action against the Netherlands.

Foreign correspondents were warned by authorized sources at The Hague to limit their dispatches on defenses to material appearing in Netherlands papers.

The government planned to request a German investigation of Thursday night's border incident, in which one or two persons were reported shot on Netherlands soil and carried, with several others, into Germany by occupants of a German automobile.

Military measures, not officially explained, continued in both Belgium and the Netherlands. Belgium's mobilization was at a near-high of 600,000, while sections of the Netherlands' defensive water system were flooded.

Pope XII, in a special encyclical, asked today that the Christian spirit be applied toward a solution of differences between capital and labor in the United States.

A settlement would "bring great honor to the American people," the pontiff said in the message to American bishops issued in connection with the 105th anniversary of the founding of the Catholic hierarchy in the United States.

It was the 21st anniversary of the World war armistice but for Germany it was a "day of sorrow" for victims of an attempt on the life of Adolf Hitler.

The Fuehrer returned to Munich to honor the seven killed Wednesday night in the explosion in Naziism's beer hall shrine which Hitler escaped by 11 minutes. Later he visited the hall and then visited the 43 persons in a hospital who were injured in the blast.

Rudolf Hess, No. 3 Nazi, in an eulogy declared "victory will be ours, thanks to our dead," in the war among Britain, France and Germany.

The current conflict overshadowed Armistice day observances in Britain and France. German scouting planes were reported over northern France and a 70-minute air raid warning was sounded in Paris.

The traditional nation-wide silence in Britain and ceremony at the Cenotaph in London were foregone.

The air ministry announced a British scouting plane had failed to return from a flight over Bavaria.

Small neutral countries on the fringe of Europe's war were on the alert for eventualities.

Switzerland gave her generalissimo, Henri Guisan, the power to call all able-bodied men to the colors whenever he should think it necessary.

Precautionary measures continued in the Netherlands and Belgium. The Belgian cabinet weighed the situation last night in the fourth session in as many days.

The observance of Armistice day in the United States centered on the tomb of the unknown soldier overlooking the Potomac.

The treasury in Washington got out its pencil and figured European nations owed the United States \$14,407,101, \$40,922 as a result of the World war.

Because of the 1939 war, the League of Nations cancelled plans for sessions next month of its assembly and council.

Germany, which rose strong and defiant under Nazi rule from a humiliating defeat proclaimed to the world by shattering sirens 21 years ago, this Saturday, was threatening Friday to loose powerful blows "at any moment" against the enemies who crushed her in the war of 1914-1918.

Armistice day 21 years after conclusion of the "war to end war" finds the chief European antagonists of the World war deadlocked in another conflict straining at its present limits and threatening at any hour to engulf other nations.

The foremost figure of the present struggle, Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany, who was an obscure corporal in the last war, says he is fighting now to wipe out the "robbery and injustice" of the Versailles treaty which followed the first Armistice day.

Chief interest Friday centered on the troubles besetting little Belgium and the Netherlands and
