

SCOTTISH RITE SLATE REUNION FOR NOV. 15-17

The Scottish Rite Masons of Klamath and Lake counties in southern Oregon and Siskiyou and Modoc counties in northern California will hold their semi-annual reunion at the Masonic hall in Klamath Falls November 15-17. This is the first reunion held by the Klamath Consistory under Letters Temporary and will be the last meeting held by the Klamath Consistory, for the reason that at the last meeting of the supreme council in Washington held in October a permanent charter was granted to Klamath Falls for both the council of Kadosh and Consistory, and these orders will be formally installed on December 4 by Sovereign Grand Inspector General Louis G. Clarke of Portland, Oregon.

Scottish Rite Masonry has made the greatest advances of any Masonic body in Klamath Falls during the past few years, and ranks well up in the bodies in the state.

The Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix were instituted two years ago and a year later Letters Temporary were granted for the Kadosh and Consistory, which completes the entire 32 degrees.

Members of the Sacramento bodies residing at Alturas and in the surrounding vicinity will confer both the 10th and 24th degrees. They will confer the 10th degree on Monday and the 24th degree on Tuesday night.

The degrees in Scottish Rite Masonry up to and including the 32nd degree are open to all Blue Lodge Masons of good standing in their community.

Scottish Rite reunions in Southern Oregon have become outstanding events, and the coming reunion next week will probably excel all others, due to the number of Scottish Rite Masons in the Klamath Basin, and the enthusiasm displayed by them for this week, according to local leaders.

Luncheon and dinner will be served during the three days in the Masonic hall and all Scottish Rite Masons are invited to attend.

MISSING SEATTLE FLYER FOUND DEAD IN PLANE WRECK

LARAMIE, Wyo., Nov. 13 (AP)—Thomas Ballard, 35, Seattle flyer, missing since last Wednesday on a flight from Omaha to Seattle, was found dead in the wreckage of his single seat plane in the Horse Creek country, northeast of Laramie yesterday.

The wreckage was found by William L. Norton, a government trapper, who said he saw it early Thursday but then believed it was a road grader.

Sheriff E. L. Wood expressed the belief the plane fell at midnight Wednesday. Ballard's wrist watch stopped at 12 o'clock. It was snowing heavily at the time he was believed to have crashed and the location of the plane indicated Ballard had circled back from his westward flight and was heading toward the beacon light on Pilot Knob, 15 miles distant.

Ballard, a bachelor, was a former member of the Omaha police department. He quit the department to become an aviator, and was employed by a commercial airline. He came to Seattle September 1.

Continuation of low "grand circle" railway fares to October 31 next year has been announced by the Association of American Railroads, according to word re- ceived today by H. I. Wayne, agent, Great Northern railway.

These fares are \$30 coach and \$135 first class with 60-day limit, allow stopovers anywhere, and apply from any point on any route in the United States between New York and San Francisco.

When the railroads learned that both these cities intended to stage World's fairs this year, they decided they would play no favorites but give the American public an opportunity to visit both shows at a bargain. It was the first time in the history of U. S. railroading that blanket fares were made good to start from any point and stopover at any place on any circuit ordinarily travelled. Passengers can go from here to Boston, to Florida, to Los Angeles and back on these fares, a distance of approximately 6,000 miles, or they can go as far west as the same way.

The Pullman company, also for the first time in its history, made correspondingly low sleeping car charges with stopover privileges anywhere which also added to the saving effected by the arrangement.

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FARM EXPERIMENT REPORTS RELEASED

The experimental program for agriculture in Oregon has been based on economy of production, conservation of soil resources and marketing improvement, according to Ralph S. Beese, vice director of the experiment station, in introducing the latest biennial report of the agricultural experiment station.

This report, just off the press, is entitled "Agricultural Research Service to Relieve the Tax Burden," and is issued as station bulletin No. 339, free to Oregon citizens.

This 176-page profusely illustrated bulletin reports on the progress being made with hundreds of agricultural problems which are classified according to the particular agricultural industry concerned. For example, all of the projects dealing with livestock management are grouped in one section, as are all those dealing with field, forage and seed crops.

Statistical reports for the biennium, which follow the much more complete reports on experimental progress, show that state tax funds now provide for only a little more than a third of the cost of agricultural research at present conducted at the experiment station. Federal appropriations account for 45 per cent of the total funds used for agricultural research in Oregon, state appropriations 37 per cent, fees and sales 16 per cent, with 1 per cent financed by gifts.

L. Swenson, director of the western regional laboratory, expressed keen interest in the work in processing farm products being carried on at Oregon State under Prof. Wiegand's direction.
