PRICES UNEVEN AS STOCKS SEE SLOW SESSION

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—Stocks wandered aimlessly over slightly uneven territory in most of today's market, but improved tendencies appeared here and there in the closing hour.

It was a slow-motion session throughout, with transfers of around 600,000 shares being the smallest for a full day in about two weeks.

Business news still was to the liking of Wall Street with the steady flow of earnings and dividends furnishing further confirmation of the fall upswing.

At the same time, likelihood of some "corrective" recession in the next few months was recognized in financial quarters.

Brightening the scene was a jump of one point in this week's steel mill operations. At 93.5 per cent of capacity, output was, for the second week, highest since the American Iron & Steel Institute began issuing estimates in 1938.

OLSON REPLIES TO RECALL WITH PLAN

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 13 (AP)—A proposal to pay \$50 a month or more to citizens over 60 years was Governor Culbert L. Olson's direct reply today to the clamor in California for increased old age pensions.

Olson, threatened with recall action by supporters of the twice-rejected "ham and eggs" scrip pension plan, declared California must "take the lead" in efforts to persuade the national government to lower the pension age from 65 to 60 and raise the payments to \$50 a month.

In the meantime, the governor announced in a radio address last night, he will submit the \$50-a-month pension program to a special session of the state legislature expected to meet shortly.

California now pays a maximum of \$35 monthly to needy aged persons.

Olson's proposal immediately was denounced by Dr. Francis E. Townsend, the California promoter of the \$200-a-month Townsend old age plan.

Interviewed in Nashville, Tenn., the elderly pension leader termed it "futile," "unfair," "just a waste of public money."

U. S. Senator Sheridan Downey of California, speaking in Los Angeles, urged sponsors of an Olson recall movement to "forget" their grievances against the governor for opposing the "ham and eggs" proposition.

"I express no opinion upon the possibility of recalling Governor Olson," he said, "but I am confident that an attempted recall would sadly injure the state of California and inevitably weaken the economic cause for which we struggle."

WHEAT DECLINES CENT PER BUSHEL

CHICAGO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Declines of about a cent a bushel in the wheat pit today reflected selling induced by price talk reports coming from Europe and prospects of possible moisture relief in the domestic wheat belt later in the week.

Tending to encourage some buying that helped to check the decline late in the session was an announcement of an increase in flour export subsidy on four exports from the Pacific coast 20 cents a barrel and on shipments from other ports 10 cents.

Rallying slightly from the day's lows, wheat closed 1/4 cent lower than Friday. December 5 1/2-1/2c, May 8 1/2-1/2c, corn 1/4-1/2c down, December 5 1/2c, May 5 1/2c; oats 1/4-1/2c down.

Medford High Schedules Tilt With La Grande MEDFORD, Nov. 13 (AP)—The Medford high school football squad, state title contenders, will play the La Grande high school team here next Friday night.

November 17, it was announced Monday by Leonard P. Mayfield, principal of the Medford senior high school.

The clash was made possible when MacLaughlin high of Milton-Freewater, originally scheduled to play here Friday, graciously cancelled its date with the Black Tornado. Principal Mayfield said MacLaughlin high agreed to call off the game, provided the two teams would play next year, if both were contenders.

Word from La Grande's team of the acceptance of the Medford challenge was contained in a telegram from James King, La Grande school principal.

Medford in its drive for consideration as a title contender, has scheduled a game here Thanksgiving day with Coquille, an undefeated, unscathed upon coast area squad. Efforts to arrange a game with Milwaukie, of the no name league failed.

The La Grande outfit is undefeated in eastern Oregon, but has a tie with Pendleton. Medford's record is the same.

Dom DiMaggio Sold to Red Sox by Seals

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13 (AP)—Respectable Little Dominic DiMaggio, voted the Pacific Coast baseball league's most valuable player last season, goes to the American league Boston Red Sox next year—climbing into the majors from San Francisco sand lots just as his two elder brothers did.

Sale of Dominic's contract, along with that of Larry Powell, young left-handed pitcher, was announced by the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific coast league. Powell will report in 1941.

Frank "Lefty" O'Doul, manager of the Seals, said "we get cash and two players" from Boston.

"The players will be decided at the Major league meeting in Cincinnati Dec. 4," O'Doul said. "I am not at liberty to discuss the cash involved."

Beavers Lose Five Players In Hard Tilt

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—Five members of the Oregon State varsity who were injured in the game with the University of Oregon Saturday will be unable to practice this week and some of them may not be able to play against California here next Saturday.

The Beavers defeated Oregon, 19-14 for their sixth victory against one defeat. Duran, half-back, sustained a lacerated cheek, M. Kohler, half, a badly sprained left thumb; Jim Kisselburgh, full-back, a badly bruised shoulder; Bob Pena and Walt Jelmsa, end and tackle, respectively, injured knees.

Trainer Del Alliman said it would not be known until Thursday whether all of the injured Orangemen would be available for the Bear game.

HT. 0 KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13 (UP)—Santa Clara's fast-coming Broncos stepped over Michigan State, 6-0, Saturday in an intercollegiate football game played before 25,000 fans. The Broncos whipped in a touchdown nine minutes after the game started, played its reserves for most of the game and kept Michigan State on the defensive except for one brief moment in the third period.
