STOCKS DRIFT DOWNWARD ON SELLING WAVE

NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP)—Selected stocks broadened mild selling currents in today's market but the list generally drifted downstream.

Efforts to stir up a rally in the first hour met with scant response and early fractional advances were soon erased or replaced by small minus signs in many instances.

Analysts in the financial district apparently were unable to bring out any outstanding reason for the recently chilly speculative sentiment. Mystification still attached to the fact that stock quotations have been hovering at about the same level at which they were this time last year while business and industry have far outstripped 1938.

Buyers by generous year-end dividends and heartening earnings statements, presented a firm front, but the majority of these did not run away.

Many commission house customers were disposed to keep funds liquid because of the forthcoming holiday. The exchange will be closed Thursday for the early Thanksgiving day.

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21 (AP-USA)—HOGS: salable 900. California butchers 15-20c lower; top 40c down to 36.35c on about 50 head good to choice 194 lb. Idahos, few over and under weights sorted out \$5.35; top and bulk good to choice 150-225 lb. Californias \$6.25, 140-160 lb and 235-270 lb. sorted out \$5.65; sows 25c lower, medium to choice sows 4.00-7.5c.

Scattered sales all classes about steady; short load medium 1129 lb. grass steers \$9.00, few common 7.25; good under 1000 lb. fed steers quoted up to \$9.50; short load medium 757 lb. heifers off beef tops \$7.50; few common to medium range cows \$5.25-7.5c, good quoted to \$6.50; few cutter cows \$4.75-5.00; canners eligible down to \$3.50; bulls weak, common to medium \$5.50-6.25. PROGRESS MADE ON DAIRY BARN

TULELAKE—D. W. Turnbaugh is completing this fall one of the most modern dairy barns in the Klamath basin, the new building to have a floor space of 42 by 23.6 feet. Walls will be of concrete to a height of three and one half feet, topped by a frame construction. A modern four-room milk house and a refrigeration plant is included. Turnbaugh is at present milking 60 head of cows, mixed Jersey and Guernseys. He has 28 head of pure bred Guernsey heifers of Tillamook stock, nine of which are milking. Milk from the dairy, one of the largest in the basin, is sold to the Klamath Falls Creamery.

All feed, a balanced ration of hay, oats, barley and cotton seed meal, is ground on the ranch. Turnbaugh has been in the dairy business for 23 years.

WHEAT MARKET UP, DOWN, CLOSES EVEN

CHICAGO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Duplicating the action of yesterday's market, wheat prices today advanced about a cent and then lost all of the gain. December contracts reached 89c, their best level since the end of 1937, but retreated in late profit taking.

Reports of bad yields revealed by early threshing of wheat in northern sections of the Argentine held attractor's attention. Some late selling was associated with the downward trend of securities.

Wheat closed 1-2c higher than yesterday, December 88 1/2c, May 86 1/2c; corn unchanged to up, December 50 1/2c, May 52 1/2c; oats 1c lower to 1c higher.

SCATTERED QUERIES IN WOOL REPORTED

BOSTON, Nov. 21 (AP-USA)—Scattered inquiries were being received today in the Boston wool market from top makers and worsted manufacturers but this interest was not being followed up by any large scale buying. The recent improvement in the underprice of the market, however, was being maintained and quotes as well as inched firmer than last week on several kinds of domestic wools. Twelve months Texas wools were sold at prices ranging mostly 97 cents to \$1, scoured basis.

TURKEYS SELLING AT 25 CENTS ON PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Nov. 21 (AP)—Retailers offered turkeys freely today as low as 25 cents a pound for No. 1 hens.

The wholesale trade reported 22 and 23 cents a pound generally and occasionally 24 cents for small hens. Toms ranged around 19 and 20 cents. Buyers were not generally offering more than 20 cents for hens and 16 cents for toms.
