CE CONFERENCE WILL OPEN ON FRIDAY NIGHT

TULELAKE

TULELAKE — Rev. James H. Edgar, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Ashland, with Miss Irene Forsythe, returned Monday night from Tsing Tao, China, Miss Dorothy Kiklis, Portland, state president, Phil Barrett, Eugene, state union officer, and Walter Meyers, Eugene, state field secretary, will be on the speakers' program for the 10th annual Klamath-Lake Christian Endeavor union convention to open here Friday evening, November 24. The convention continues through Saturday and Sunday.

Opening at 7 p. m. with registration, introductions, a song service and worship service, the speakers' program will get under way with an address, "Christ Calls to Personal Christian Experience," by Rev. Edgar. A social meeting will follow.

A message from the state president, Miss Dorothy Kiklis, at 10 a. m. on Saturday will follow a quiet hour beginning at 8:45, and panel discussions.

At 2 p. m. the afternoon session opens with Miss Forsythe, speaking at 2:30 on "Christ Calls Through His Workers." A banquet will be served in the new addition to the church at 6:30 by the Community guild. Harold Van Duker, student pastor now filling the pulpit at Mt. Laiki, will be toastmaster. The evening sermon topic will be "Christ Calls to Christian Growth."

Breakfast on Sunday morning will be served at 8 o'clock in the church annex for the union executives with a quiet hour and communion service to precede the 11 o'clock service at which Rev. Edgar will bring the message.

Sunday afternoon the sermon topic will be "Christ Calls From Other Lands," followed by a decision service and supper at 5 o'clock. The C. E. Endeavor groups meet at 6 p. m. with Rev. Lawrence Mitchell, pastor of the Merrill Presbyterian church, to lead the discussion for the young people's group and Miss Pauline Alexander, the high school group.

Rev. Edgar will again bring the message at 7 o'clock speaking on "Christ Calls to Action." A fire-side sing will close the convention. All sessions except the banquet will be presided over by Hugh Kaffon, Klamath Falls, president of the Union, with representatives of both Christian and Presbyterian churches of that city, and of Altamont, Mt. Laiki, Tulelake, Merrill, Malin and Lakeview to be in attendance. About 100 young people are expected to register.

Election of officers will be held during the banquet Saturday night.

Malin Farmers Gratified Over Lower Freight Rates

MALIN—Farmers of the Malin district are expressing gratification over the reduction in freight rates from Malin to Willamette valley points, granted recently by the Southern Pacific railroad. Announcement of the cut in hauling charges was made in a letter received this week by Irving Capek, secretary of the Malin chamber of commerce, which for the past two years has supported farmers of the Malin district in a request for lower transportation charges.

The reduction will become effective at an early date according to Ormand R. Bean, Public Utilities Commissioner, Salem.

Differentials in the rates between other shipping points to the south end of the Klamath basin, namely Hatfield and Merrill and Malin growers have been the basis for the controversy.

Ormand in his correspondence regarding the proposed rates stated that the following tables show the reduced variation to northern points.

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PUMP TEST HELD IN MERRILL WELL

A pump test was recently completed on the new city well at Merrill. A flow of 325 gallons per minute was maintained during the test which only lowered the water level in the well five feet. The water level in the well when the pump is running is 52 feet and the water is very soft and pure.

The well had to be drilled to a much greater depth than was anticipated, the original contract having a 600-foot depth limit. When a supply was not found at that depth the council decided to extend the contract. A lava rock was encountered at a depth of 986 feet and extended to 1088 feet to a bed of red clinders. A large part of the water flow is through a crevasse in the lava above the clinder bed.

The well is cased to a depth of 1024 feet with heavy pipe. Van Meter brothers were the contractors on the job.
