

IRISH, TROY TOP GRID SLATE

BIDDERS FOR ROSE BOWL IN ACTION TODAY OVER NATION

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—It has been reported the best three teams on the Pacific coast this season are Southern California's first, second and third strings.

Notre Dame undoubtedly has one of the best teams in the mid-west, if not the best of all.

That is the reason why their annual battle, rapidly becoming one of the many football traditions, is the outstanding event on today's national football schedule.

Neither team has a perfect record. The Trojans were tied by Oregon in their opener this season, and Notre Dame lost by a single point to Iowa two weeks ago. It is the final game of the season for the Irish, but USC has two more to play, and probably will appear in the Rose bowl Jan. 1.

Bidding for the other place in the Rose bowl, or for invitations to other bowl games, are Tulane, Duke, Missouri and perhaps a few others who are listed to play today. Two of the most important entries in the national championship race—unbeaten and untied Tennessee and Texas A. and M.—aren't scheduled to play until Thursday.

Tulane, seeking at least a tie for the Southeastern conference title, plays the weak Sewanee team today and is expected to catch up with Tennessee in the race. Georgia Tech, also unbeaten in that circuit, has a slightly harder assignment against Florida.

Since its triumph over North Carolina, Duke is conceded to be the Southern conference's best team and should dispose of North Carolina State in today's winnow. However, the Blue Devils can't claim a clear title, if Clemson gets safely past Furman.

Misouri, averagely looking for a bowl bid, meets Kansas in a game which should clinch the Tigers' claim to the Big Six crown. They can't get worse than a tie, for they have beaten Oklahoma and Nebraska, which meet in a second-place battle.

The Ohio State-Michigan classic winds up the Big Ten race with the Buckeyes out to gain their first conference championship since 1920 at the expense of the preseason favorites. Once-beaten Iowa is the only team that can tie Ohio State, and Northwestern may prove a lofty hurdle for the Hawkeyes to clear. Indiana-Purdue, Illinois-Chicago and Wisconsin-Minnesota are other conference windup games.

The east doesn't have any official championship, and Cornell, rated the best team in the section, likely wouldn't accept a "bowl" bid of any kind. Nevertheless, there is plenty of action with Cornell's big Red team trying to finish a perfect season in its traditional struggle with Pennsylvania, Yale and Harvard coming together in the 55th game of the ancient series and Duquesne, only other major undefeated and untied team in the east, facing Carnegie Tech.

Important east-west interconference games are Kansas State-Boston College and Temple-Michigan State.

Baylor's effort to conquer Southern Methodist and thus remain in the conference title race, if Texas A. and M. should slip, is the main event of the southwestern program. There is a similar situation on the Pacific coast with unbeaten UCLA facing once-beaten Oregon State.

Timberline Ski Instructor Says Learning Easy

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore., Nov. 25 (Special)—Tom Hill, one of the nation's outstanding American born ski instructors, is head of the Timberline lodge ski school this year, and his motto is: "If you can walk you can ski."

A former competitive skier for the University of Washington and several ski clubs, he has been skiing 12 years, exactly half of his life. Assisting him will be Steve Tredway of the Seattle Penguins, also a veteran instructor.

"I will teach the Arlberg system of skiing as developed by Hannes Schneider," said Hill. "Emphasis will be placed on controlled skiing for beginners and also for competitive skiers."

"Of course competitive skiers 'open up' more than ordinary skiers, but control is a vital part of competitive skiing."

Hill says it is easier to learn to ski than to learn to walk, provided the right approach is made. The average person who never has skied can learn the rudiments of the art in a week, he said.

Longest Winning Streak Snapped

HUMBLE, Tex., Nov. 25 (AP)—Eleven Humble Iron men, playing without a single substitution, snapped the longest winning streak in Texas schoolboy history by upsetting Hull-Daisetta 13-0 last night.

Hull-Daisetta had won 13 straight, starting in 1935.

NORTHWEST CONFERENCE PLOTS YEAR

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25 (AP)—The Northwest conference re-elected Charles P. Robbins, College of Puget Sound, president and Paul Murphy, College of Idaho, secretary yesterday, and adopted 1940 baseball, football, basketball, track and tennis schedules.

It was the first time in history the league completed its winter business in one day.

R. V. Borleske, veteran Whitman coach, was re-elected president of the coaches and managers of the conference, and L. J. Sparks, Willamette graduate manager, was re-elected secretary.

Rumors that College of Idaho would be dropped from football proved unfounded when the Coyotes were scheduled against Pacific, Linfield, Puget Sound and Whitman.

A four-year rotating basketball schedule found College of Puget Sound back in the cage league again. Albany College of Portland asked reinstatement in basketball and baseball but was not included in the schedules. Several league schools will play Albany, however, and the school when ready to compete in all sports, will be reinstated.

Baseball schedules will be drawn by the east and west divisions and the pennant will be decided in an inter-divisional play-off at Walla Walla May 23-24-25. The league track meet will be the night of May 17 at Walla Walla and the tennis championships will be decided at Salem on May 18. 1940 football schedule included:

Olympic Games Shunted Aside Because of War

BERLIN, Nov. 25 (UP)—The Olympic games, a symbol of international peace, were shunted aside because of war today when Germany officially cancelled the 1940 winter program, scheduled for Garmisch-Partenkirchen in February.

It was the second setback suffered by the XII Olympiad. Japan previously had to renounce both winter and summer games because of trouble in China. Germany was awarded the winter games, Finland yet hopes that the European war might end in time for the summer competition.

Billy Conn Voted Award for Boxing

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (UP)—Billy Conn, the ring's glamour boy who resurrected the light heavyweight division and revived Irish fighting prestige, was voted the Edward J. Neill memorial plaque today for having made the outstanding contributions to boxing during the current year.

Handsome Billy of Pittsburgh, who won the world's light heavyweight championship in July and has defended it twice, since then, was voted the plaque at the annual meeting of the Boxing Writers association of New York. He won over heavyweight Champion Joe Louis by 18 to 5 votes.

The writers took into consideration Conn's stimulation of a division that had been decadent since the days of Paul Berlenbach and Jack Delaney more than a decade ago. They considered also Billy's ringcraft, his zest for battle, his clean conduct in and out of the ring, and his willingness to meet all comers. Also the fact Billy came up to the throne "the hard way," his record was pounded out against the stiffest opposition and had no taint of build-ups against push-overs.

After winning the title from Mello Bettina on July 13, Billy gave the rugged Beacon, N. Y., Italian a chance to regain it on Sept. 25. When Bettina failed, Conn immediately agreed to defend the crown against the most dangerous contender, Gus Lesnevich. And he whipped Lesnevich impressively a week ago tonight.

Billy will be brought to New York by the Boxing Writers' association and presented with the plaque at the Edward J. Neill memorial dinner later this winter. Conn plans to leave Pittsburgh for Los Angeles Monday night. He will remain in southern California for at least a month resting and trying to gain weight so he can campaign in the heavyweight division. He hopes for a crack at Joe Louis' crown by next September. If Billy, at 22, can add 10 pounds to his current 172, he probably will be matched in six weeks or so for a fight with Lou Nova or Johnny Paycheck. Later he would be thrown in with Bob Pastor.

Montana Prep Champs Seek Game in Bowl
BILLINGS, Mont., Nov. 24 (UP)—Montana's state championship Billings high school football team would like a bid for the proposed Miami, Fla. "Starlet bowl" game, Coach Clyde Carpenter said today.

The Broncos earned their second consecutive state title yesterday by trouncing Great Falls high, 33 to 7. The victory was their 17th since they were last beaten in state and interstate competition.

Carpenter said his team would challenge any state high school championship eleven with a comparable record for a Christmas day post-season game.
