The second complaint charged that Fales "caused to be displayed merchandise on the sidewalk without first obtaining permission of the city council." Fales entered pleas of guilty to both charges.

Checks for Relief Total Half Billion in Four Years

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Checks totaling close to half a billion of dollars were sent to persons in the northwest United States from April 8, 1935 until October 31, 1939 for relief purposes.

The treasury department summary of such expenditures by states showed that Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Washington received \$431,532,375. Alaska received \$6,501,621 during the same period.

Washington received the largest amount of the four states, \$203,032,064. Oregon \$98,672,309, Utah \$63,604,343 and Idaho \$66,201,774.

The summary listed Washington as receiving in the fiscal years 1935 and 1936 \$44,942,620, 1935 and 1936 \$44,942,620, 1935 and 1936 \$44,942,620, 1935 and 1936 \$44,942,620.

In the 1937 fiscal year Washington got \$50,002,115, Oregon \$26,000,703, Utah \$14,617,379 and Idaho \$15,401,195. In the 1938 fiscal year Washington was listed for \$35,140,554, Oregon \$16,690,235, Utah \$9,514,092 and Idaho \$9,373,427.

In the 1939 fiscal year Washington was credited with receiving \$44,867,679, Oregon \$18,233,798, Utah \$12,355,107 and Idaho \$11,460,020.

In the present year, from July 1 to October 31 Washington received \$5,053,896, Oregon \$4,337,479, Utah \$2,799,369 and Idaho \$2,915,169. The total for the four states compared with \$601,233,712 for California, \$461,412,122 for Massachusetts, \$423,366,760 for Michigan, \$1,425,653,560 for New York and \$972,081,724 for Pennsylvania for the 1935-1939 period.

Alaska's total in 1935 and 1936 years was \$3,960,994, in 1937 it was \$1,596,208, in 1938 it totaled \$407,301 while in the 1939 year the aggregate was \$412,896. So far in fiscal 1940 its total was \$61,222.

The summary set the total of relief checks in the United States for the period at \$1,476,026,645.
