

HENLEY TO TAKE PART IN CARNIVAL

FOOD PRICE BOOST UPS LIVING COSTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—An increase of 3.6 per cent in the cost of food during the three months ended September 15 sent the cost of living for families of wage earners in 32 large cities up 1.2 per cent for the period.

Secretary Perkins, reporting on the increase today, said the rise in food costs occurred largely between the middle of August and the middle of September although the cost of all items entering into the survey, except rents, was above the June level.

In only two of the 32 cities, Denver and Minneapolis, where the food costs were lower, Denver reported a decline of 5.2 per cent and Minneapolis reported a drop of 5.7 per cent from June 15 to August 15 but with an increase in the next month. New York reported an increase of 7.5 per cent in food costs.

New York was the only city in

which the cost of living was greater than two per cent for the period, it reporting all costs were up 2 1/2 per cent.

The secretary said the increased cost of living in the quarter of year "almost exactly compensated for the decline which occurred between December 1938 and June 1939."

Costs of September 15 stood 17 per cent below the peak point in December 1929 and 11 per cent above the low point in June 1932. The changes in the costs of all items entering into the budget of wage earners and the change in cost of food in the three months included: Los Angeles, up 0.4 and 2.2; Portland, Ore., up 0.8 and 2.7; San Francisco, up 1.7 and 6.4; Seattle, up 0.9 and 4.0.

Same Goal Set for New Year in Soil-depleting

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—The agricultural adjustment administration today set the 1940 goal for soil-depleting crops at 270,000,000 to 285,000,000 acres, the same as this year.

It increased the acreage for wheat and cut the rate of soil conservation payments on that grain to 9 cents a bushel from this year's 17 cents.

The corn acreage goal was lowered slightly and the payments to cooperating farmers set at 10 cents a bushel, compared with 9 cents this year.

Cotton acreage was unchanged, and the rate lowered to 1.6 cents a pound from 1.8 cents. Acreage goals remained the same for potatoes.

"Insofar as authorized funds permit," said R. M. Evans, AAA administrator, "the 1940 program continues the efforts of farmers toward abundance for the nation's consumers, conservation of our vital soil resources, and parity income from agriculture."

"With it, farmers are prepared as never before to meet the shocks imposed by war in Europe and further demoralization of world trade. They have in the program a means of avoiding costly maladjustments such as resulted from the World War."

The 1940 program will offer more opportunity for soil conservation than did this year's, officials said, largely through revised rates of payment designed to encourage practices not normally carried out on many farms. Common practices, such as seeding alfalfa, will be given less credit.

At normal yields, officials said, the 1940 program would provide ample supplies for all domestic needs, export requirements, and an adequate reserve.

Payments for wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and rice will be supplemented by parity payments from a special \$225,000,000 appropriation if the 1939 average price proves to be less than 75 per cent of parity. Those payments are designed to lift farm purchasing power to the level it occupied before the World War.

The national acreage for 1940 and 1939 includes wheat, 60,000,000 - 65,000,000 and 55,000,000 - 60,000,000; potatoes, 3,100,000 - 3,300,000 and the same for 1939. The acreage goal for commercial vegetables was unchanged from this year—an unannounced area equivalent to 1937-37 acreage. Acreage for general crops was placed at 145,000,000 to 150,000,000 acres, the same as the 1939 figure.

Payments will be on the normal yield of 1940 acreage allotments. The comparative rates of payment for 1940 and 1939 include wheat, per bushel, 9 cents and 17 cents; potatoes, per bushel, 3 cents and 3 cents.

Nation's Latest Ships Become More Effective

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (UP)—Experiments in marine engineering in the "face of conservatism, trepidation and no little opposition" have increased the effectiveness of the nation's newest warships, Acting Secretary of the Navy Charles Edison was informed last night.

The statement was made in the

annual report of Rear Admiral Harold G. Bowen, as chief of the bureau of engineering, for the fiscal year ended June 30.

Bowen recently was named director of naval research and was succeeded by Rear Admiral Samuel M. Robinson.

Bowen's report did not define his remarks except to say "particular reference is made to the adoption of high pressure, high

temperature steam condition for steam-propelled vessels." He added that "the present standard steam condition for new construction in the navy is 600 pounds per square inch pressure, and 550 degrees Fahrenheit temperature."

He told how the navy, by gradual steps, had raised the temperature and pressure to new heights so the size of propulsion machinery can be reduced and its power

increased as metallurgic developments made it feasible.

His report made indirect mention of the current controversy over charges some of the navy's new destroyers are top-heavy, saying the 1500 and 1850-ton types are "reliable and efficient," although such "few troubles as have developed have been relatively minor" and are being corrected as the vessels become available.
