

AFL LEADERS SCOFF AT VANDAL CHARGES

ABERDEEN, Wash., Dec. 6 (AP)—Two leaders in the American Federation of Labor-Sanmill Workers' union branded as "ridiculous" today the charges on which they were arrested last night in connection with Saturday's vandalistic raid on the Finnish federation's workers' hall here.

The arrested men were Ward Penning, field worker until recently for the state department of labor and industries, and Joe Lalonde, executive board member of the Oregon-Washington council of the Sanmill Workers' union.

Both were arrested on warrants sworn to by two members of the rival CIO International Woodworkers of America.

Penning, accused of malicious destruction of property and of attempting to provoke an assault, was released on \$100 bail posted by an AFL official. Lalonde, charged only with attempting to provoke assault, was released on \$50 bail, posted by a prominent Grays Harbor sportsman.

Penning and Lalonde said they were present only as spectators when a mob broke the workers' hall windows, wrecked fixtures and furnishings and burned pictures of communist leaders. They charged that they were accused because of their anti-communist stand in Grays Harbor activities during the 1935 strike and afterward.

"I welcome this affair because it will clear the atmosphere," Penning declared. "My record is clear and this is the first time I ever was arrested."

The two men were taken into custody as they waited at AFL headquarters for officers to serve the papers.

August Heino, secretary of the Finnish federation, issued a statement today denying previous reports that the dance was scheduled originally in the hall on the night of the raid was a communist affair. He said the dance was one of the regularly scheduled events of the Finnish federation.

Caustic criticism of the hall raid and police officers came today from the Seattle branch of the civil liberties union and spokesmen for CIO groups.

The civil liberties union letter to the mayor suggested "possibly a grand jury investigation of the forces in the community that are flaunting law and order might be the only means of bringing the truth to light."

THREE UNIONS CERTIFIED FOR WEYERHAEUSER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—Three separate labor unions were certified by the labor board today to represent employees of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Longview, Wash., in collective bargaining.

The three organizations were selected as bargaining agencies by the timber company employees in an NLRB election last month.

The board certified the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) as the bargaining agent selected by the boom men, rafters and allmen.

Conductors and brakemen employed on the timber company's railroad selected the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, while the firemen and engineers voted for the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

In the case of the railroad workers, the engineers and the trainmen selected the railroad brotherhoods in preference to CIO and AFL lumber workers unions.

GIRL TESTIFIES AGAINST BUSBY IN MERCED CASE

MERCED, Calif., Dec. 6 (AP)—Prospects of going to a fashionable school in San Francisco, with pretty clothes, lured Dorothy Thompson, 14, to leave her livingstone home with Merrill Busby, 23, she told a superior court jury here.

The school girl was the first prosecution witness yesterday against Busby, charged of child stealing, abduction and conspiracy. He was jointly accused with his sister, Sally Stanford, and Dorothy Heber, both of San Francisco, but later they won a separate trial, scheduled for next Monday.

Dorothy testified Busby took her to San Francisco last September 13, kept her in various hotels until September 18, and then took her to Oregon, telling her the police were looking for him. They lived at a tourist camp at Cave Junction, Ore., until federal men took them into custody, she said.

KLAMATH BUREAU FINDS 522 JOBS

SALEM, Dec. 6 (AP)—The Albany office of the state employment service, center of the state's turkey industry, led the state by finding jobs during November for 1601 persons. Portland was second with 978.

Figures for other cities included: Klamath Falls 522, Eugene 377, Roseburg 339, Newport 313, Salem 256, Ontario 302, Corvallis 205, Medford 53 and Pendleton 35.

BUILDING REACHES HIGH MONTH TOTAL

SEATTLE, Dec. 6 (UP)—Pacific northwest building last month reached the highest November total since 1930 and topped the November, 1938, figure by 125 per cent, the Seattle Daily Journal of Commerce said today.

Work was started on 2278 projects last month, with an estimated expenditure of \$4,397,663 as against 2323 projects and \$4,095,616 in October and 1716 projects and \$1,943,976 a year ago.

For the first time in several years Oregon led four northwest states, its 10 leading cities authorizing work on 719 projects at an estimated cost of \$2,195,390—an increase of 211 projects and \$1,431,978 over last year.

Portland's total of \$1,753,890—including a \$1,000,000 hospital—was responsible for Oregon's leadership, and paced northwest cities.

Washington's 15 cities over 10,000 population granted 1273 permits for \$1,741,745.

Ranking behind Portland were: Seattle, \$684,246; Tacoma, \$186,000; Spokane, \$278,104; Medford, Ore., \$191,080; Boise, \$133,734; Bremerton, Wash., \$105,616; Billings, Mont., \$88,496; Twin Falls, Ida., \$66,765; Eugene, Ore., \$66,097.

CHANGES MADE IN LIGHT SYSTEM FOR BIG UNDERPASS

After a number of changes were found necessary in the three-way light system on the recently completed Main street underpass, City Engineer E. A. Thomas reported Tuesday that the lights were now working satisfactorily.

Flashers have been turned on between the hours of 8 p. m. and 7 a. m. and motorists are advised that when the lights are flashing it is not necessary to wait for green lights as has been done.

The flashers will also be used all day Sundays, it was reported.

70,000 PHEASANTS RELEASED IN STATE

Of this number, Klamath county received 2396 pheasants.

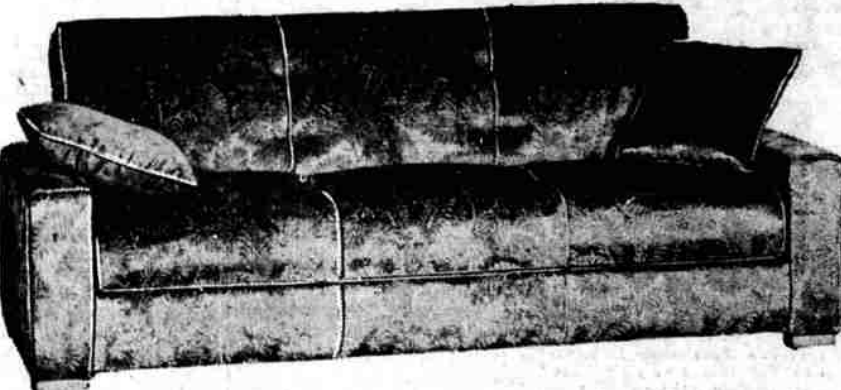
