

## DELEGATES OF WILDLIFE CLUB EYE CONCLAVE

Chairman Hal Ogle and O. D. Matthews were named Wednesday night as delegates of the Klamath chapter of the Oregon Wildlife Federation to attend the wildlife convention at Corvallis Friday and Saturday.

Either one or both of the Klamath men will attend.

At the Wednesday night meeting Chairman Ogle reported seeing one band of 75 antelope in the Foster flat district near Summer lake.

He suggested the possibility the antelope herd there has increased to the place where it is serious competition for the deer feeding in that area. He said it might be advisable to have an open season on antelope in the Summer lake area as well as in the Hart mountain district, where such a season was declared last year.

Ogle said also that gray squirrel season in Jackson county, opening a week before the deer season, seems to have caused some trouble in the woods. He said that in the Jenny creek district "squirrel hunters" this year allegedly killed two deer and a cow.

"I don't know whether they mistook these animals for squirrels," said Ogle.

## 14 Italians Die In Bomber Wrecks

ROME, Dec. 7 (AP)—Officials said today the crash of three Italian bombers in which 14 persons were killed was due to a violent storm and to ice on the wings of the planes.

Thirteen fliers and one farmer hit by a crashing plane lost their lives in the accident yesterday. Five airmen escaped by means of parachutes. The planes belonged to a group flying from a northern Italian air base to Sicily.

## AMERICAN FINNS JOIN ARMY TO FIGHT RUSSIANS

HELSINKI, Dec. 7 (AP)—Two hundred and thirty Finnish-Americans, some of whom never before have been in Finland, arrived today to enlist in the Finnish army to fight against Russia. A spokesman for the group said they left New York as soon as they learned Finnish independence was threatened. They sailed for Norway, and

then journeyed by train across Sweden to Helsinki.

News of the Russian invasion reached them as they were waiting in a railroad station in Sweden. When they boarded their train they offered the conductor money for every minute cut off the regular schedule, the spokesman said.

The group expects to be sent to the north central sector of the front.

More Finnish-Americans will follow as soon as possible, they said.

## YOUTH HAS DUTY, SPRAGUE SAYS

SILVERTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The public and the government have a right to expect young persons to take their government seriously in exchange for such provisions as modern school buildings. Governor Sprague said last night at the dedication of Silverton's new high school.

"I hope they won't feel," he said, "that the government, federal, state and local, is only giv-

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ing them something." Rev. M. J. K. Fuhr, member of the Lutheran brotherhood, gave a brief dedicatory address. Secretary of State Earl Snell also spoke.

The Nobel peace prize award for 1939 will not be made this year, dispelling rumors that the award would be given to Joe Stalin for his heroic stand against Finland's threat to Russia.
