SERVICES HELD FOR TULELAKE HIGH ATHLETE

TULELAKE—Death came to Bryan Decker Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Decker, Tulelake, December 3 at Yreka after the young man, 17, injured a year ago in football here, was believed to be fully recovered.

A junior in the Tulelake high school, young Decker suffered amputation of his leg last winter in a Yreka hospital after complications set in. Partially recovered, he returned to his classes here and only recently had gone to Sacramento where an artificial limb was to have been fitted. A malignant condition developing in the injured member spread to the lungs, causing death. He attended school apparently in good health until 10 days ago.

Funeral services were held Monday in Yreka from the Hills and Burton funeral home with Rev. E. E. Malone, pastor of the Methodist church, Yreka, assisted by Rev. Hugh L. Bronson, pastor of the Tulelake Presbyterian Community church, Interment was in the Yreka cemetery.

High school classes were dismissed Tuesday by Principal George Reiben and approximately 100 students and faculty members attended the services. Edna Marie Griffin and Evelyn Haas, accompanied by Barbara Bentley, all Tulelake high school students, sang "Tory Palace" during the service. Pallbearers were all students from Tulelake.

The young man is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Decker, two sisters, Marilyn and Lillian, and an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Decker, all of Tulelake.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt, who has had fun with reporters over their speculation on his 1940 plans, last night passed up an opportunity offered by the National Press club to indicate his intentions.

Mr. Roosevelt was given a hat and a large ring to throw it in at the Annual Founders' dinner of the club, but he made no use of them.

A nautical setting was arranged for the dinner, and opposite the table where the president sat with Acting Secretary of Navy Edison, Secretary Hull and others was a large cartoon showing Mr. Roosevelt as Popeye the Sailor on the deck of a top-heavy destroyer. Speeches were off the record.
