were associated. But on Jan. 14, 1935, Miss Pickford was given a final decree and less than two months later Fairbanks and Lady Ashley were married in Paris. Miss Pickford later wed Charles (Buddy) Rogers, actor and orchestra leader. Fairbanks rose to his greatest fame after his marriage to Miss Pickford. He began producing as a member of Famous Players-Lasky and later United Artists, in which he was associated with D. W. Griffith, Miss Pickford and Charles Chaplin. His greatest personal successes of the period were "Robin Hood," "The Mark of Zorro," "The Thief of Bagdad," "Don Q. Son of Zorro," and "The Three Musketeers." All were characterized by his leaps from ever-present danger. Among his efforts after talks arrived were "Taming of the Shrew," in which he was starred with Miss Pickford, "Reaching for the Moon" and "Mr. Robinson Crusoe." In 1933, he joined Alexander Korda in London to make "The Private Life of Don Juan." Since then he had been off the screen. He disposed of his interest in United Artists in 1937 but had recently indicated he was considering a return to producing. Fairbanks attained such popularity on Broadway that when David Wark Griffith persuaded him to enter the movies he began at \$2,000 a week. His happy sense of virile comedy and thrilling acrobatics—he fenced, vaulted and leaped from roof to roof in every early picture—whetted the popular film taste and established a new type of film. created a sensation with "The Three Musketeers" a \$700,000 spectacle. He spent freely to develop original ideas. He devoted half a year to research and production on "Robin Hood" which has been revived many times. "Thief of Bagdad" was fantastic, imaginative and thrilling. The sets and effects of the "Flying Carpet" cost many thousands of dollars. Fairbanks pioneered color pictures. He imported three European specialists and spent large sums experimenting with the new process before he screened "The Black Pirate."

serve as fire-breaks. County Judge Guy Boyington, Astoria, declared. He protested sale of government-owned timber for \$1.25 a thousand board feet stumpage when private owners had invested \$5 to \$7 per thousand before cutting started. National forest timber, he said, should "be held back" until private supplies were exhausted. Governor Sprague testified Oregon forests were valued conservatively at \$500,000,000, produced \$109,000,000 in the lowland year of 1934 and furnished direct employment for 50,000 persons, with 76,000 more working in allied industries. On the forest service's 13,782,127 acres in Oregon, counties received \$127,799 in 1938, or nine and two-tenths mills per acre, the governor said, contrasted to 12 cents an acre paid on reested Oregon and California grant lands. He declared the Fulmer act, providing loans to states for reforestation and sustained yield uses, should be passed.

tended primarily for customers of business houses, so they could drive into the zone, load up with merchandise, and move out immediately. Louis Eschle, meat dealer, said that this purpose was being defeated by lax enforcement. He made a plea for consideration of Main street business. "You don't get taxes from those fellows way out Sixth street," said Eschle. Councilman Elmer Hosking said that the city has a police department to enforce its ordinances, and that councilmen haven't time. "I suppose we'll go on paying taxes just the same," said Eschle. He related that a California woman, who drove into Klamath Falls to trade, was threatened by Officer Lewis Arnold with a double parking ticket while at the very same time the ten minute loading zone nearby was filled with a car that had been there for an hour. Councilmen concluded by claiming they had taken the action the business men wanted in establishing the zones, and enforcement is up to the police department. The council decided to re-advertise for bids on gas and oil for 1940 requirements, after a spirited discussion of its own recommendations formed at a meeting of the council as a whole last week. At that time, it seems, the council found itself with every gasoline bid exactly the same—17 cents per gallon for standard grade. One oil bid—the Shell bid—was somewhat lower than the others. After some discussion at the council committee meeting last week, the council decided to put all oil company names in a hat and have a drawing to determine which should get the bid. This was done because all gasoline bids were the same. General Petroleum corporation was the winner of the drawing. At Monday night's meeting, City Attorney D. E. Van Vactor pointed out that considering the gasoline and oil bids together, Shell's bid was actually the lowest. Councilmen said they regarded the oil as a minor consideration. Councilman Hosking, however, proposed that the council start all over again. Next time, the council will ask for separate bids on gas and oil. For several years, the council has drawn lots to determine bids when all bids and other considerations are equal. The council awarded the contract for 1940 prisoners to the Anchor cafe, tires and tubes to Hogue tire shop, servicing office equipment to the Adding Machine and Typewriter Service. G. C. Tatman, business manager for the culinary alliance, appeared at the council meeting to explain his and the alliance's attitude toward church dinners and similar affairs. He said there had been some misunderstanding after the alliance protested to the council about the Methodist women serving a dairymen's dinner. The alliance, he asserted, has no desire to hamper the church organizations or any other non-commercial groups in benefit affairs or anything of that kind. The alliance wants to "go along with the churches," he said. He said objection was made only against a type of public dinner which definitely competes in a large way with business houses that pay their city licenses, pay the taxes, and employ labor at fair wages. There was another involved

discussion of the George Duke taxi operations, when Duke asked for permission to operate a third car for the remainder of 1939 without paying a year's license fee for \$50. He applied for a 1940 license fee for this car at \$50. When told the ordinance would require that he pay the fee for operation this year, Duke said he could show the council where taxi-cab operators had operated four cars for only \$100—the fees for two cars.

When Councilman Elmer Hosking asked him to name names, Duke said he was not going to "play dirty," and that while he said he could, he would not do so. The council finally referred the matter to itself as a committee of the whole.

Last night's session ended with another burst of minor fireworks over the purchase of fire hose.

Fire Chief Keith Ambrose said he wants to buy 500 feet of fire hose. This would normally cost more than \$500, requiring an advertisement for bids. Ambrose, however, said he would buy only 250 feet at this time, and the council authorized the purchase of that amount.

Council Elmer Hosking, chairman of the fire committee, said he anticipated protests if the city goes out and buys from specific individuals without first advertising for bids and giving everyone a chance. Ambrose indicated he had selected the firm from which he plans to buy the hose, and the council decided to leave the matter up to the chief.

a continuation of the wet season would send water over the reclamation dike, although Willard Smith, assistant US reclamation engineer, said he thought there was no immediate danger to the reclamation dikes which are three feet higher than lease dikes. He described the US dikes as 11 feet high, 11 feet across the top and 30 to 35 feet through at the bottom.

Homesteaders asked the council to take immediate action on the matter and the city attorney, E. W. Eschling, was authorized to make telephone contacts with three California members of congress, Harry Englebright, Hiram Johnson and Sheridan Downing, and Congressman Walter Pierce of Oregon. This to be followed by a letter of explanation and copies of the council's resolution stating that an emergency exists in the flood area and requesting an immediate investigation.

Individuals of Tulelake were advised to contact all civic organizations in the Klamath basin and ask cooperation in putting through the Tulelake sump project now before the federal bureau of the budget.

Spokesmen for leasees and homesteaders were John Kandra Jr. and Charles Cox. They sought assistance for the dikes, asking that they be made safe for the "next two years." It is understood that the major portion of the leases run for that period.

The two ranchers told council members that a portion of the dike would have to be ripped with rock. The dike in question is on land now under water and formerly known as the Cox brothers lease dike. Mayor Lou Booth Monday night announced a hearing of the county board of supervisors to be held December 18 in the Carr school in regard to reorganization of the rural fire department. The department was originally organized in Siskiyou county to take in Modoc county at some future time. This situation was found impossible at a recent election and it was decided to dissolve the original board and reorganize in Modoc county, later to include Siskiyou county. It was reported not necessary for a new election according to rules of the new act.

WILLAMETTE PASS CLOSED BY SNOW

The Willamette highway, the big new cross-state thoroughfare which will be finished next year, is closed to travel. It was announced by the chamber of commerce Tuesday.

Although there is a detour around construction on the road, it has been heavily used through the past summer. Conditions on the detour make further use of the road this year inadvisable, chamber informants said. They pointed out that next summer the road will be finished and the detour eliminated.

Road conditions generally were about the same as Monday, according to the chamber's information department. Ice has melted from pavement surfaces in some stretches, but cautious drivers should have chains with them.
