

COUNCIL ON CHARITY IS FORMED HERE

A "Christmas Charity Council" was formed at a meeting held Tuesday at the chamber of commerce, with the purpose of coordinating Christmas charity work in this community and eliminating duplication.

Those attending included: Adjutant Bowyer of the Salvation Army, Frank Peyton, representing the Elks lodge; Carl Cook, police judge, and representing the Santa Claus Club; E. G. Murray, representing the city recreation committee; Fire Chief Am-Connor and Earl Reynolds Jr., representing the Hi-Y organization of Klamath Union high school; Mrs. Altha Urquhart, representing the Klamath county relief committee; Jack Keenan, representing Turner Chevrolet company, and Earl C. Reynolds, representing the chamber of commerce, who acted as chairman.

It was decided that Recreation Officer Murray would be the individual through whom the various organizations will work. Bob O'Connor and Earl Reynolds Jr. of the Hi-Y organization of Klamath Union high school stated that their organization agreed to provide at least 200 baskets to the needy poor, securing a list of these families from Murray. It may be that there will be more than 200 baskets, but the Hi-Y felt that they could at least supply that many. They sought the cooperation of any firm or individual who would loan a pickup or truck for delivery during the week of December 18, with or without a driver. Murray volunteered the use of the city recreation wagon.

Frank Peyton outlined the tentative plans of the Elks lodge for Christmas charity work this year. The lodge will place emphasis on bringing Christmas spirit and cheer to adults, one plan being to provide radios for use of inmates at the county infirmary.

Chief Ambrose reported that the fire department would give toys to needy children as far as they would last. In this regard, Police Cook offered his assistance in trying to secure more toys for repair by contacting the various schools in the system. The question arose as to the possibility of giving toys to needy families outside the city limits of Klamath Falls and Chief Ambrose replied that they were perfectly willing to do this if their supply of toys held out.

Adjutant Bowyer stated that he would concentrate his Christmas work on the giving of clothing, the giving of a few baskets in cooperation with the Hi-Y and to take care of transient families and transient single men on Christmas day. In this regard all those present were urged to remind the public that clothing would be welcome at the Salvation Army, and the Hi-Y representatives stated that they would put this fact in their bulletin, and Adjutant Bowyer promised to pick up the clothing from the school.

Police Judge Carl Cook stated that the usual Santa Claus dinner would be held Christmas eve at the Klamath Falls armory and that they anticipated serving about 750 to 1000 meals.

Russian Churches Used as Hospitals

MOSCOW, Dec. 13 (AP)—Churches in Leningrad were converted into military hospitals today as a steady stream of red army casualties from the Finnish fronts overtaxed the city's regular hospital facilities.

While Tass, soviet official news agency, distributed without comment Russia's rejection of the League of Nations' mediation offer in the Finnish dispute, newspapers gave glowing reports that Finns welcomed their Russian "liberators" in the army-occupied sections.

Workers in the United States, Britain and Sweden, the newspapers said, welcomed the new communist-headed Finnish "people's government" set up at the border village of Terijoki.

Red Star, organ of the army, said workers of United States as elsewhere throughout the world looked to the soviet union for leadership.

ture that it has to make, one gesture that it cannot refuse to make, unless it is prepared to resign its function in the spirit of a truly suicidal defeat."

Freyre declared the soviet union had violated the league covenant and her non-aggression pact with Finland.

Thus, he declared, "constitutes a veritable challenge to the league and is an insult to all governments of which it is composed."

"The question now before us is whether we are going to continue to allow the perpetrator of this act of aggression to sit among us. My government considers this impossible."

Freyre declared: "If we are to spare the world from the abyss which is opening before it, if we are to bring about a rebirth of international law, it behooves us to realize that the time has come to set aside considerations of a material character and rally those moral forces which have fallen into oblivion."

"International law, and all law indeed, demands for its proper functioning the existence of moral climate, and this moral climate cannot exist without sentiment of honor."

Envoy to Belgium Backs Third Term

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Joseph E. Davies, ambassador to Belgium, reaffirmed his support of President Roosevelt for a third term after a White House call today and declared he believed "America is in jeopardy as it certainly has not been in our generation and probably not since its institution."

The ambassador said that it was not a matter of personal desires for a third term that should be considered but now a question of "who is the best man to keep America out of this thing when the whole world is on fire."

He added he knew for certain that the president did not want another term.

300 ABSENT FROM SCHOOL CLASSES

More than 300 children were reported absent in the city schools Wednesday as the mild epidemic of la grippe and throat infections continued in Klamath Falls.

According to J. Percy Wells, superintendent of public schools, the following figures were obtained from the seven schools in the city:

Fairview—normal absences of 14 reported Wednesday. As high as 110 were absent during the height of the epidemic in that district last week.

Joseph Conger—28 absences, largest number since epidemic started.

Mills—75 absent Wednesday, largest number reported.

Pelican—50 absent, largest number.

Riverside—26 absent. Less than number reported absent last week.

Roosevelt—40 absent. Greatest number absent last week was 60.

Fremont—70 absent, virtually same as last week.

Total absentees in schools of city, 303.

In Klamath Union high school on Wednesday slightly "over 200" students were reported absent.

Virtually all teachers have been bitten by the epidemic bug at one time or another within the past two weeks, it was learned.

In Klamath county schools absences among students was reported "above normal."

TROUBLE LOOMS ON RECREATION SITE

Protests are expected at a meeting of the city council Friday evening at 5:30 o'clock against the recreation committee's proposal for development of a recreation center in Mills addition near Adams and Vine streets.

The committee at Monday night's council meeting asked that the city withhold from sale several city-owned lots at that location. The plan also calls for removing the buildings of a private property holder, at a cost of \$400, to another piece of city-owned property, which would be transferred to him in exchange for the land he holds now in the proposed recreation site.

A woman who was active in opposing the recreation site on Klamath Development company property nearby in a controversy over a year ago, said that the same group is opposed to the new proposition.

"We want the recreation money conserved for development of a swimming pool and for other uses

that will be beneficial to smaller children," she said. The recreation committee said the property would make an ideal development for both softball and baseball.

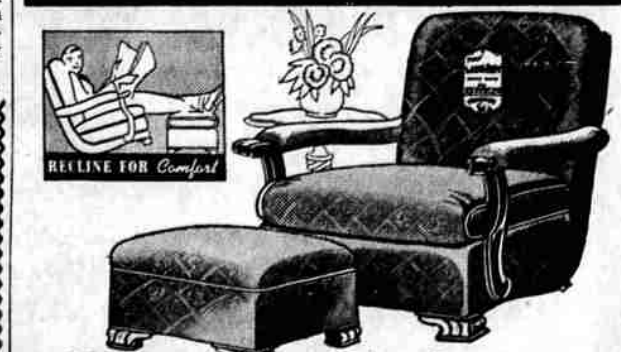
