FOUR TEAMS SET TO OPEN BASIN LEAGUE

Plans for Two Bouts Bog Down

CLEVELAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—Negotiations were opened yesterday for the title fights when Promoter Mike Jacobs of New York contacted Nate Druxman, Seattle promoter, on the telephone.

"Uncle Mike" of New York's 20th Century club made the first move, Jacobs telephoned Druxman in Cleveland to this effect: "Let's match Al Hostak and Ceferino Garcia for Madison Square garden sometime this winter and settle the middleweight championship dispute."

It seems Hostak, the "Savage Slav" from Seattle, is recognized as middleweight champion by the national boxing association, where Ceferino Garcia of the Philippines is acknowledged by the New York commission.

Unquestionably Promoter Jacobs' telephone call was actuated by Hostak's first-round knockout of Eric Seelig at the Cleveland arena Monday night.

The experts who watched Hostak's first appearance east of the Rockies were unanimous in their opinion he is the hardest puncher the middleweight division has known since the days of Stanley Ketchell.

"Uncle Mike" also talked with Hostak's manager, Eddie Marino, but that wined conversation accomplished virtually nothing.

Marino, who is a very warm friend of Druxman, informed Promoter Jacobs Hostak would be delighted to appear at New York's Madison Square garden under these conditions:

(1) That Billy Conn, who is under contract to Jacobs, defend his lightweight championship against Hostak, in return for which Hostak, who is recognized as a middleweight champion by the national boxing association, would defend his 160-pound claims against Ceferino Garcia at New York for Jacobs. Garcia is recognized as middleweight champion by the New York commission.

The negotiations were halted brusquely when "Uncle Mike" hung up his ear piece with the concluding remark, "Nerts."

Second Place in Poll Hot Contest

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Yet the combined vote for these four gridiron powers was only slightly more than half the total the Yankees rolled up in winning recognition as "outstanding team of the year, amateur or professional," for the fourth straight year, just as easily as they skyrocketed to their fourth straight world championship with a woful walloping of the Cincinnati Reds in October.

Sixty-one of the 79 experts who cast ballots from all parts of the country picked the Yankees an undisputed No. 1 team. Another split his ticket between the Yankees and the Hawkeyes. Thirteen others put the Yankees in second place. There were only four who didn't mention them.

Of the 17 first-place selections in which the Yankees led not figure this year, seven went to Iowa's footballers, two to Southern California, three to Tennessee, two to Cornell and one each to the basketball teams of Oregon and Ohio State and to the footballers of Pennsylvania State college. The Oregon basketball team stood seventh with 12 points.

Judge Distributes Savings to Idle

AUGUST, Ga., Dec. 13 (AP)—Nearly 1000 unemployed here received unexpected Christmas gifts today, a share in a "political tithe" distributed by 43-year-old City Judge Gordon W. Chambers.

Judge Chambers, World war veteran serving his tenth year on the bench, said he mailed out approximately 1000 checks averaging \$1 each, a "dividend to the people who have been so good to me."

The money represented a tenth of his savings.

Several checks were returned, he said, by persons who had obtained jobs and were no longer in need.

2000 ARRESTED IN KLAMATH IN 1939

More than 2000 persons were arrested in Klamath Falls this far in 1939, according to a report filed by city police with the city clerk.

Arrests during the month of November totaled 242 persons, officers said. There were 78 accidents during the month which added to make a total of \$20 for the year; seven auto accident injuries were reported with a total of 48 thus far in 1939. Only one automobile accident death has occurred within the city since January 1, 1939.

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 13 (AP)—The Boston Bruins rocketed to a first place tie with Toronto in the National Hockey league race by defeating the Detroit Red Wings, 3-1, before 10,000 fans last night.

The champions, held even for more than two periods, scored twice in the final period to clinch the victory. Herb Cain tallied the decisive counter at 4:44 on a double prelay from Woody Dumart and Art Jackson. Mel Hill added a third goal less than four minutes later on a pass from Bill Cowley.

Rookie Jack Shewchuk netted his first league goal to give the Bruins a 1-0 lead mid-way in the first period. Carl Liscombe, assisted by Don Deacon and Mud Bruneteau, scored the equalizer at 12:36 of the second period.
