

BRITISH WATCH PUT ON POCKET SHIP'S HARBOR

as well as slighter damage from shelling along her starboard above the waterline, particularly in the engine room area.

A silent, awed throng jammed police lines through the night, craning for a glimpse of the battered ship.

The extent of the British casualties remained unknown. There had been no British attempt to land dead or wounded on the Uruguayan coast.

Reports that many had been killed and wounded among the cruiser Exeter's crew—normally about 600—were without verification. The Exeter was knocked out of the battle after four hours of cannonading, leaving it to the Achilles and Ajax to put the German warship to flight.

Apparently the Exeter, 1500 miles from her Falkland Islands base, was seeking to make emergency repairs here. Officials from the British legation boarded her to survey her damage and to obtain an account of the battle.

To informed persons it appeared that within 30 days would be needed to repair the Admiral Graf Spee. These sources expressed the opinion that the Exeter would not be willing to make such a journey.

The cruiser Achilles and Ajax, along with the cruiser Exeter, were the conquerors of the Admiral Graf Spee—in all, 22,405 tons of speedier naval power against the larger guns of the 10,000-ton pocket battleship.

The Exeter, 3390 tons, was in the battle for only four hours before the 11-inch guns of the German warship knocked it out of action.

The 10,000-ton Achilles and the 6925-ton Ajax pounded the Admiral Graf Spee for the entire 14 hours—from 6 a. m. (1:30 a. m. PST) until after 8 p. m.—their six-inch guns almost constantly ablaze.

The engagement—the greatest naval encounter of the war thus far—occurred within the American neutrality belt and much of it could be seen from the Uruguayan shore. Observers and radio stations gave Uruguayan a virtual round-by-round account of daylight portions of the fight.

(Informed circles at Washington believed no issue would be raised over the fact that the encounter took place within the pan-American neutrality zone. It was pointed out that the zone was designed to prevent belligerent activities harmful to American interests.)

The Admiral Graf Spee touched off the battle when she came upon the cruiser Ajax just after dawn yesterday. The British warship was conveying the French merchantman Formosa from Brazil to Uruguay.

The German vessel rushed into battle, her heavy guns blazing. The French freighter slipped away to safety. The Ajax returned the German fire with her six-inch guns, momentarily repulsing the attacker and at the same time summoning the Achilles and Exeter.

Quickly the Germans found the tables turned with their 20-knot battleship harassed by three faster but lighter-armed British ships. The Ajax and Achilles made 32.5 knots, the Exeter 32.

The Admiral Graf Spee apparently found the Exeter's eight-inch guns particularly damaging for she turned her back on her other attackers to concentrate volley after volley on the Exeter, heavily of the three British men of war.

This concentration of fire put the Exeter out of the battle after four hours, her armor—from two to three inches thick—battered by the German shells. But the diversion benefited the other two British ships.

The six-inch guns of the Achilles and Ajax were more than a match for the 11-inch weapons of the Admiral Graf Spee and she squirmed to escape. Observers at Punta Del Este lighthouse on the Uruguayan shore saw the pocket battleship steam away to the southwest but the Achilles and Ajax were at her heels, relentlessly firing.

The two British cruisers pursued their quarry to Montevideo harbor after night had fallen. The gunfire that had reverberated up and down the coast, sometimes barely nine miles off shore, continued for some time after dark.

The battle occurred 25 years ago to the month after the British Admiral Sir Doveton Sturdee caught German Admiral Von Spee's two armored cruisers, three light cruisers and three supply ships off the Falkland Islands, near the southern tip of Argentina.

All but one of the German ships were sent to the bottom. That was on December 8, 1914, and the victory gave Britain undisputed command of main ocean routes for the rest of the world war. Yesterday, in another war, it was the battleship namesake of Admiral Von Spee which was beaten.

MONTVIDEO, Dec. 14 (AP)—How three British cruisers, like well-trained hounds worrying a huge bear, slashed at the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee until the badly damaged warship was forced to take refuge in the neutral harbor of Montevideo, was described by eyewitnesses and authorities today.

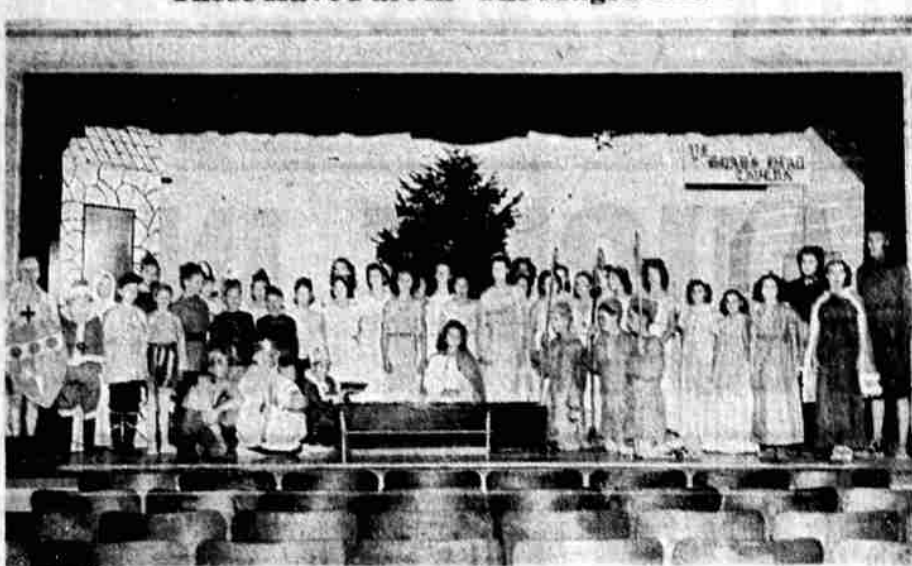
From their accounts was pieced together a picture of the day-long battle. It showed the British cruisers Exeter, Achilles and Ajax, their guns outranged at least 3000 yards by the 11-inch German guns, used every trick known to naval warfare to beat down their larger opponent's defenses.

The British made "magnificent" use of smoke screens, witnesses said, to avoid exposing themselves disastrously to the Admiral Graf Spee's heavier gun-fire. The cruisers were said to have darted from behind these sheltering smokecreens to fire their own salvoes, then retreated swiftly from sight, constantly shifting their positions.

Although out-ranged and lacking their opponent's heavier armor, a British official said the lighter cruisers had to close in despite the 850-pound projectiles the pocket battleship was hurling. To avoid these shells, one of which almost ripped a turret from the Exeter early in the battle yesterday, the British cruisers resorted to hit-and-run tactics, maneuvering at high speed behind their dense smoke screens to throw the German gun layers off the target.

By these tactics, they worked in close enough for the Exeter to train its eight-inch guns, firing 256-pound shells; and the Achilles and Ajax to use their six-inch guns, throwing 100-pound projectiles.

The assembly meets again (next September) our feeble efforts will not have been in vain.

After the vote against Russia the assembly received Finnish thanks.

Finland's delegate, the white haired Rudolf Holsti, walked to the tribune amid loud applause to express the Finnish people's "profound gratitude."

He said the amount of practical aid which Finland would get from the assembly's action depended upon the capacity of the league's coordinating staff and the co-operation of the civilized world with that staff.

Before the assembly vote, Great Britain informed the league she already was "taking steps to enable the Finnish government to obtain the material required for their defense in England."
