

MOTHER HELD FOR ALLEGED CHILD THEFT

Charged with child-stealing in Yuba county, Calif., Mrs. Beatrice Sylvia has been arrested here on a fugitive complaint issued in Klamath county following receipt of information from Yuba authorities.

Sheriff Lloyd Low said the case involves Mrs. Sylvia's own child and a disagreement over technicalities that grew out of a divorce proceeding involving Mrs. Sylvia and her husband.

The woman was arrested at the home of her mother, Mrs. R. E. Harvey, on Keno road. She was released on her own recognizance pending determination of her bond by the justice of the peace office.

The sheriff said he was told the child had been secretly in the custody of the probate court in Yuba county, and had been staying with relatives of the father. Mrs. Sylvia said she was informed by her attorneys she could take the child, and did so.

FINN RESISTANCE SAID IMPRESSIVE

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Dec. 21 (AP)—Back from a European tour, Dr. Ralph Lutz, director of the Hoover war library of Stanford university, talked today of the Finnish-Russian war and said that on his visit to Finland the spirit of resistance on the part of the Finnish people had impressed him greatly.

Lutz was in Finland in late September and early October when the threat of soviet invasion, which materialized November 20, was just arising.

He said the manner in which the Finns prepared to defend their liberties warranted general admiration. He said the women especially rallied to the cause, forming a relief corps known as "Lotta" to help their fighting men in case of emergency.

Lutz visited the Finnish defense

lines and found that while they were not so strong as France's Maginot line they were devised with an eye to using the full topography of the country and seemed very adequate.

He said the national defense equipment of the little republic was so complete it included equipment for ripping up rails in event of retreat.

He ventured no opinion of the outcome of the war, pointing out Russia was a mighty nation using its full strength.

Lutz said during his stay in Europe, covering the period before and after the outbreak of war September 1, he established agencies to collect materials for the library on war, revolution and peace established by former President Herbert Hoover here. Lutz believed the materials which will be collected will be as fully representative of the current conflict as Mr. Hoover's World War collection of documents, treaties, correspondence and other materials.

EXTENT OF WOODS' INJURIES UNKNOWN

SHORT SESSION SEEN FOR SOLONS

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 21 (AP)—Possibility of a streamlined special session of the legislature in January was seen last night as sources close to Gov. Culbert Olson disclosed he was disregarding most of the bulky program he had tentatively hoped to submit.

Olson delayed until "sometime next week" his promised outline of what the session will consider and the starting date, which is likely to be January 15.

Assembly Speaker Paul Peek, administration democrat from Long Beach, was one of those who told the governor today the agenda should be limited to funds for relief, new revenue measures to pay the bill, and perhaps one or two minor measures.

It was understood reliably Olson has discarded his intention of seeking liberalized pensions, reorganization of state government (with the possible exception of a changed liquor control setup) and a half-dozen other proposals that various department heads wanted included.

The San Francisco waterfront tieup is expected to bring an Olson recommendation for broader powers for the state harbor board to take over the port. Removal of the old age property lien clause in the pension setup is a likely proposition. But the remainder of the broad 14-point program suggested to legislators last week by the governor is believed out of the picture.

Burdick said he expected his crew to stage 50 gigantic roundups over 168,000 square miles during January. The roundups will offer the strange combination of modern science—exemplified by radio and airplane—linked with dog teams and the Eskimos' native resourcefulness.

While 10 radio-equipped roundup houses direct the ground work in different sectors, Burdick will scurry between sectors by airplane, directing activities with his two-way radio.

In this land of winter darkness, the work will be done by moonlight to the baying of wolf packs across the snow. When there is no moon, there will be no work. Wolves are expected to be a menace only in the far northwestern Kotzebue area, where herders must keep a constant guard over their herds.

The roundups will be for counting and division of the unbranded animals, expected to be about two-thirds of the total, among the various owners on a pro-rata basis.
