

SECURITY PLAN FOR OLDSTERS TO BE STARTED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (UP)—The federal government puts into operation next month its far-reaching plan to provide mass security in the form of monthly retirement pensions for older workers and their dependents.

It will be the beginning of the monthly pay-off of old age insurance benefits under the social security law, and estimates indicate that during 1940 more than \$100,000,000 will be distributed to approximately 1,000,000 persons.

The social security pay-off will not approach the goals of various proposals advanced by old-age pensions groups. For the most part it may fall short of the \$55 a month average security wage paid WPA workers.

Small Amounts
Government statisticians have estimated payments for retired single men will average \$26 a month for life. The estimated average for a married man who receives a supplemental benefit for his wife will be about \$39.

The tops in government old age benefits is \$85 a month, but to get it, a married man would need to be covered by the social security system for 40 years and be able to show an average of \$250 a month in earnings throughout that period.

The start of payments for January — for which checks will reach beneficiaries about February 1 — will put into operation the final phase of the social security act approved by congress in 1935 as one of the key features of the new deal program to provide systematic security.

Other parts of the law already are in operation providing federal financing for the administration of state unemployment compensation plans, and federal grants to the states for the care of the needy aged, the blind and the dependent children.

The old age insurance plan contains many limitations, but basically it aims to provide a lifetime retirement annuity for the wage earner who retires at 65 or older from a job covered by the law.

His benefits — the experts call them primary insurance benefits — are measured by his average monthly earnings between January 1, 1937 and the time he leaves his work to retire. They are paid for by a social security tax both he and his employer contributed in equal amounts to the government's old age insurance fund.

Thus both the worker and industry have financed the insurance plan of retirement benefits. The boss and the worker each contributed one cent on the dollar of wages paid out.

Last summer congress revamped the law to extend the benefits and the scope of coverage.

Originally the pay-off was scheduled for January 1942 and provided benefits only for the worker regardless of his dependents or survivors.

As the law now stands, it offers monthly benefits for wives and widows who have reached the age of 65, for children in school up

A wife and each child are entitled to supplementary benefits equal to one-half the husband's primary benefit, and a widow is entitled to three-fourths of the primary benefit. Where there are no immediate survivors of a worker, such as a widow or child, a dependent parent is entitled to a benefit equal to one-half the primary amount.

ARMY STARTS BIG RECRUITING DRIVE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (UP)—Army recruiting sergeants will take to the air next month in a super-selling effort to fill the 227,000 enlistment quota set by President Roosevelt.

Four flying recruiting units—two planes each—will tour the country from coast to coast. The tour is another part of the campaign to "glamorize" the army, using all the high-pressure methods of modern American business — and more besides. "Glamor" is a word found in the army's own publicity.

For the first time, magazines soon will be carrying army advertisements, paid for by some commercial sponsor. "In the interest of national defense." The ads will show soldiers in laboratories and planes and even on kitchen police duty.

For the last two months, the army itself has been paying for recruiting ads in newspapers, especially those in small towns and rural areas, where the army finds most of the best of its recruits.

At any moment, your local radio station may give out one of eight transcribed programs appealing for enlistments.

In neighborhood theaters, too, the same sort of talk can be heard, with accompanying pictures of the army in action. Three movie "trailers" have been made by the army.

Even the open road soon will be used by recruiting officers. Bids have been requested for 18 luxurious offices on wheels—big truck-and-trailer combinations with sleeping quarters for five soldiers.

Meanwhile, a glamorized "Miss Liberty," with bronze hair, beckons to young men from 75,000 army posters in buses, trolley cars and subways, from 15,000 billboard sheets, and from the signboards in front of 44 recruiting stations and 408 sub-stations (112 more than on Oct. 2).
