NORTH BEND SENDS LOCALS HOME AFTER HOOP SHUTOUT

Led by a deadeye sharpshooter named Crowell, the North Bend basketball team turned on a scoring attack in the last half at North Bend Saturday night to defeat the Pelicans hoopsters 35 to 27 in the last game of a coast barnstorm trip.

The locals lead the coast aggregation 16 to 14 at halftime, but Crowell and his mates rang up 21 more points during the game to lead by a big margin at the final whistle.

Crowell scored 18 of the North Bend total. Eugene Love was high point man for the Pelicans with 8.

The defeat was the third straight for the Pelicans, Marshall having posted a 24-21 win Friday night and Coquille a 21-17 victory Thursday night.

Next weekend the Pelicans will entertain Ashland and Grants Pass on Friday and Saturday nights, respectively, on the KUHS floor.

Broncos Whip New Yorkers

NEW YORK, Jan. 1 (UP)—Santa Clara's whirlwind basketball quintet practically passed City college of New York's team out of Madison Square Garden Saturday night as they scored a 52-30 victory, their seventh straight, in the first game of a collegiate doubleheader before about 13,000.

Led by Toddy Giannini and Bruce Hale, a pair of the fastest forwards to trot the Garden boards in several seasons, the Broncos handed City college its third straight defeat. Giannini and Hale piled up a total of 34 points between them, Giannini sinking nine goals and two fouls for 20 points while Hale, leading scorer of the team last year as a sophomore, sank four goals and six fouls in six attempts. The Broncos, considered the best team in the school's history, handled the ball with the facile ease of well-molded units, looping the ball in with an exhibition of one-handed shooting that was machine-like in its accuracy.

Santa Clara, holders of the northern California basketball league title, outplayed the Beavers in every department and breezed to a 10-1 lead in the five-minute mark of the first period, before Izzy Schnadow scored City college's first point on a free toss.

Harvey Lozman, lanky Beaver center, kept his club barely in sight of the Broncos caging four field goals.

The Broncos coasted in during the second half and were never threatened.

Byron Nelson Named Winner Of Golf Cup

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 1 (UP)—Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., national open golf champion, Saturday was named winner of the Professional Golf association's Harry Vardon Memorial Point trophy.

The trophy, equivalent of the outstanding player award in baseball, was given on the basis of points scored in Professional Golfers association tournaments in 1939.

Fred Corcoran, manager of the PGA tournament bureau, said Nelson had scored 473 points during the year. Henry Picard, the chocolate soldier from Hershey, Pa., placed second with 461 points and Sammy Snead of Hot Springs, Va., was third with 345. One point behind him was Ralph Guidahl of Madison, N. J., with 344.

BOWL GAMES MASS CROWDS FOR NEW YEAR GRID FINALE

An idea which had its inception nearly 40 years ago, when Michigan agreed to play Stanford in a New Year's day football game under auspices of the Tournament of Roses committee, reached its fullest growth today when some 300,000 football fans turned out in six different cities to see New Year's day "bowl" games.

The first game was played January 1, 1902, and Michigan won, 49-0. The first real Rose bowl game was played between Washington State and Brown in 1916, and it has been an annual fixture, growing more important each year, ever since.

The twenty-fifth Rose bowl game at Pasadena, Calif., today was expected to draw 92,000 spectators for the battle between the unbeaten teams of Southern California and Tennessee.

Both teams went through the season undefeated, although the Trojans were tied twice. Each won its conference championship—Tennessee in the southeastern conference and Southern California in the Pacific coast loop—

and Tennessee's Volunteers were not scored upon all season. The game promised to be another thriller like the 1929 encounter in which Southern California passed its way to a last-minute triumph over Duke.

Crowds ranging from 70,000 at the New Orleans Sugar bowl to 15,000 for the El Paso, (Tex.) Sun bowl were expected for the other New Year's day games.

Three other conference champions and a couple of near-champions were lined up for these younger "bowl" encounters, in addition to the picked teams of senior stars from the east and west in the annual Shrine charity game at San Francisco.

Mighty Texas A. and M., unbeaten southwest conference champion, met Tulane, another "power" team, in the Sugar bowl with the Aggies rated 2-3 favorites despite southern fans' protests.

Georgia Tech, also unbeaten in the southeastern conference but rated a trifle weaker than Tennessee or Tulane, met Missouri's Big Six titleholders before a sell-out throng of 38,000 in Miami's Orange bowl.

A fourth southern representative, Clemson, encountered Boston college in the Dallas Cotton bowl, where about 30,000 fans were expected. Clemson, unbeaten in the southern conference, held a timid claim to the championship generally awarded to Duke.

Dixie Howell's Arizona State Teachers of Tempe, border conference champions, met the Cardinals of Catholic university in the Sun bowl.

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Southern Gridders Defeat North Team

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Jan. 1 (UP)—The South beat the North today as a high-scoring band of boys from Dixie licked a team from the other side of the Mason-Dixon line, 33 to 20, in the second annual North-South all star football game.

The game was wide open from the second minute when Jack Nix, speedy halfback from Mississippi State, took a pass from Ken Heineman, Texas Mines back, on the South 42 and scampered past five tacklers to score standing up.

Ten thousand fans and 16 bands roared "Dixie" from opening whistle to closing gun as the South reaped revenge for the 7-0 defeat it suffered at Northern hands in last year's game.

Game statistics demonstrated

the manner in which aerial offense was accentuated by both teams. The South attempted 19 and completed 10 forward passes for an aerial yardage of 211. The North tried 22 passes, completed 9 for 139 yards. The boys in gray intercepted five northern passes to gain an additional 145 yards.

Heineman and young Bussey of L.S.U. carried the southern passing load, with Ken Kavanaugh, L.S.U.'s all-American end, snagging two long ones for touchdowns.

The big guns for the North were Hutchinson of Dartmouth, Zontini of Notre Dame, Marino of Ohio State and Principe of Fordham who kept the contest exciting by ever-threatening to break loose and wipe out the early Southern lead.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 1 (AP)—Don McNeill, 21-year-old Kenyon college student from Oklahoma City, and a "Clinderella" doubles team of Gardner Mulloy and Henry Prusoff served notice today they were headed for bigger and better things in the tennis world in 1940.

Yesterday McNeill trounced America's No. 1 ranking singles player, Bobby Riggs of Chicago, to win the Sugar Bowl invitation tournament championship. The score was 7-5, 6-3, 6-2. The Mulloy-Prusoff combination beat Riggs and Elwood Cooke of Portland, Ore., for the doubles crown.

Prusoff, Seattle player, and Mulloy, of Miami, entered the Sugar Bowl singles and just decided to team up and enter the doubles. They had never played together before.

They got to the finals by beating McNeill and Morey Lewis of Texarkana, Ark., Saturday, then overcame Riggs and Cooke, the nation's No. 2 doubles team, 5-7, 6-4, 6-2.

Mulloy said after the match that he and Prusoff would continue as a team.

"We play well together," he said, "and we'll enter as a team in the Dixie championships at Tampa, Fla., starting Tuesday."

Two Huskies Tie For Sun Valley Ski Sweepstakes

SUN VALLEY, Ida., Jan. 1 (AP)—Two University of Washington skiers were tied in the lead for the sweepstakes trophy today as the second annual Sun Valley intercollegiate ski meet moved into the last half of its four-event program.

The two were Carl Neu, winner of the slalom race yesterday and ninth in Saturday's cross country, and Harold Gjølme, who placed sixth in the slalom and fourth in the cross country.

Both had earned 185.35 points. In second place was Otis Lamson, also of Washington, with 182.18 points, and in third, Ring Thorngren, of Washington State college, with 182.18. Dave Quinney of the University of Utah ranked fourth with Tom Cushman, Washington fifth.

Neu outpaced a field of 42 skiers, representing 13 colleges and universities, to win the slalom. He covered the course twice in a total time of 76.4 seconds, just two seconds better than Quinney's second-place 78.4. Elton Blazier, Washington State, was third in 80.4 seconds.

Master Miler Beaten in Race

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 1 (AP)—Glenn Cunningham, the old master of the millers, bowed to superior legwork and strategy by Archie San Romani yesterday in the 1500 meters run of the Sugar bowl track meet.

The little runner from Emporia, Kas., who holds the world 2000 meter record, defeated his fellow Kansan and Blaine Rideout, of North Texas Teachers college, before 15,000 spectators—largest crowd ever to see a track meet in the south.

San Romani's time was 4:02, slow for the field assembled.

March Farmer, of Texas Tech, one-armed hurdler, won the 110 meter high hurdles in 14.5, a foot ahead of Allan Tomlich of Detroit.

John Quisley, Manhattan college freshman, took the 400 meter run in 48.4 seconds, pulling out in front of Roy Cochran of Indiana university. Edwin Miller of Anaheim, Calif., was third.

Tommy Deckard, gangling Indiana runner, was the only repeat winner, capturing the 3000 meter steeplechase in 9:17.5. Forest Elave, of Oklahoma A. and M., was 30 yards behind.

Campbell Kane of Indiana U beat out Wayne Rideout of North Texas Teachers in the 800 meters with a 1:54.3 time.

Walter Mehl, University of Wisconsin redhead, outlasted Don Lash of Bloomington, Ind., and Greg Rice of Notre Dame in the 3000 meter run. His time was 8:44.8.

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FINNISH RELIEF DRIVE ORGANIZED

A drive for funds for the Finnish civilian population, recently launched by Herbert Hoover, at the request of the prime minister of Finland, is now well under way throughout the United States, and is being organized in Oregon under direction of Philip H. Carroll, Portland, whose experience in various foreign countries under Hoover as relief administrator was extensive.

National headquarters for the drive are in the Graybar building, New York City. In a new release Hoover makes clear the purpose for which the money received will be used. It is as follows:

"The field of the Finnish relief fund is the major problem of distress of the civilian population due to destitution, food shortage, textiles, shelter, care of children, movements and support of refugees, and the other major problems which affect civilian populations in war and which are much the largest part of relief to such populations. We do not, therefore, enter into the field outlined officially by the Red Cross, and which it so completely occupies."

Mayor Joseph K. Carson Jr. of Portland has already set up a committee to raise funds in that city, with Tommy Luke as its chairman. This group has planned for a big show in the Civic auditorium as one means of stimulating contributions.

Mayors of cities in Oregon have been requested to name similar groups for the purpose of planning the raising of funds through direct appeal or otherwise, and citizens of smaller communities also are urged to organize a Finnish relief program.

All Portland banks are accepting donations for the fund, which are being forwarded to the Chase National bank of New York, chief depository. The United States National and the First National of Portland are also accepting contributions at all of their branches throughout Oregon. All private banks in the state have been requested to accept donations to the fund.

Inquiries regarding the fund will receive attention if directed to Philip H. Carroll, Foot of Southwest Stark street, Portland, coordinator for Oregon for the fund.

All checks should be made payable to the Finnish relief fund and any amount will be accepted.

CAMP LAVA BEDS TO GET LARGEST REPLACEMENT CREW

TULELAKE—Camp Lava Beds with 80 enrollees returning to homes in Ohio on December 24 will receive the largest contingent of replacements of the three camps located in the south end of the Klamath basin when troop trains return about the middle of January with several hundred young men to be distributed throughout the fourth corps area.

Camp Lava Beds will receive 110 returning to homes in the south, has as yet not been notified of the number of replacements, but it is believed the total will be less than 80 and Camp Klamath at Merrill with 27 men released from service will receive 50 replacements, all from the southern states.
