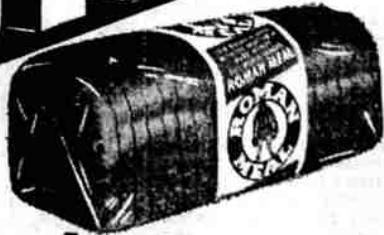

UNDERGROUND PHONE CABLE BEING LAID

Underground cable is now being installed in the conduits laid last fall on several Klamath streets by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

This is another step in preparations for the improvement of the Klamath telephone system at the time the new building at Eighth and Pine streets is completed, according to Manager Charles Seavey.

He said the work on the build-

ing is now largely inside. Installation of telephone equipment has not yet started.

The change-over to a dial system will be effected on June 1. No telephone book will be issued on May 1, as has been customary, but the books will come out when the new system is in so that they will cover the new numbers given all local telephone subscribers.
