

Eulalona Chapter To Meet January 8

Personalities of Klamath to be Topic of Discussion at D. A. R. Session at Wattenburg Home

"Persons and Personalities of Klamath" will be the subject presented by Mrs. Robert Odell, past regent, at the regular monthly meeting of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, to be held Monday evening, January the eighth, at eight o'clock, at the home of Mrs. R. E. Wattenburg, Mrs. H. E. Nitschelm, chapter regent, will preside during the business meeting. Delegates to the state convention of Daughters, to be held in Hood River, in March, and to the National Congress, to be held in Washington, D. C., April the nineteenth, will be elected at the Monday evening meeting.

Mrs. Wattenburg was the organizing regent of Eulalona chapter, served as chapter regent during the first four years of the life of the organization, and is affectionately called "The Mother of Eulalona." June, 1922, was the date for the initial organization, though the necessary twelve members had not completed their lineage requirements before June, 1923.

Charter members now living in Klamath county are: Mrs. Syd B. Evans, Mrs. Rachel Applegate Good, Mrs. Thomas Hampton, Mrs. Wilbur Jones, Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall, Mrs. Burge W. Mason, Mrs. Allen Sloan and Mrs. R. E. Wattenburg.

In 1925, during the regency of Mrs. Wattenburg, the chapter sponsored a colonial ball, which netted several hundred dollars, to be used for chapter purposes, chief of which was the placing of permanent markers at historic spots in the county. In 1926-27, under the regency of Mrs. Wilbur Jones, a second colonial ball added a substantial sum to the treasury, and during this year the chapter put a permanent marker at the site of the old stone bridge on Lost river. This marker, the first erected to mark a historic spot in Klamath county, was dedicated by Mrs. Charles Joseph Martin, during her term as regent, in 1927-1928.

Succeeding regents of the chapter have been: Mrs. Harry Aekley (1928 - 1929), Mrs. Rachel Applegate Good (1929-1930), Mrs. D. V. Kuykendall (1930-1931), Mrs. Warren Hunt (1931-1932), Mrs. Allen Sloan (1932 - 1933), Mrs. Thomas Hampton (1933-1934), Mrs. Lloyd J. Gohle (1934-1935), Mrs. George Gardiner (1935-1936), Mrs. E. D. Lamb (1936-1937) and Mrs. R. O. Odell (1937-1938).

Each regent has left something of permanent historic value to the county, as a monument to her years of service as leader in this historic, patriotic society.

St. Olaf's Choir Slated

Famous Group to Appear in Klamath January 31st

Dr. F. Mellus Christiansen, director of the St. Olaf choir, which will appear here at the Pelican theater on Wednesday, January the thirty-first is probably recognized throughout the western world as the greatest "kapelmester" of the age.

He was born in Norway, came to America when a seventeen year old, studied and taught in various cities in the middle west, and went to Leipzig, Germany, where he studied four years and spent much time in the company of his teacher, Gustav Schreck, cantor of the famous Thomaser choir.

The temptation to linger with the old Thomas church cantor was great, for he filled the place that the great Bach had occupied for many years. Once each week his famous Thomaser choir attracted thousands to hear some of the great old chorals. It was doubtless here that Christiansen received the first inspiration to go and do likewise, organize a choir that could do the same things equally well.

Schreck had this advantage. His singers were supported by the state school. They were all given thorough musical training and were under rigid discipline. Music was their business.

Dr. Christiansen's choir is composed of young men and women attending college. Their main interests are the studies of the regular college course, and their membership in the choir is extra-curricular. In spite of this difference in the organization of the two choirs, musicians and critics who have heard both the Leipzig and the Northfield choirs, marvel at the beauty and perfection of the one as well as of the other.

Without the traditions of hundreds of years as a background, in a little city of Minnesota, a state not much more than half a century old, this miracle of a world famous choir has been wrought. The choir has made the city of Northfield known from coast to coast. Its fame spread across the seas and the glowing tributes that were paid these singers and their leader when they visited Europe are among the most eloquent they have ever received.

Every year Dr. Christiansen undertakes the process of selecting new material for his choir. What principle he adopts nobody knows. The voices are not outstanding, but they fit together into that magnificent whole that has made the St. Olaf Lutheran choir the wonder of a continent.

Eagle Plume To Present Program Soon Before Club

America's greatest Indian dancer, singer of Indian songs, Interpreter of Indian culture and folk-lore, will be presented here by the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club on January the fifteenth in the library auditorium.

Among his interpretive dances Eagle Plume includes "Prairie Chicken" dance, a courtship of the young girls by the braves. This takes place in the springtime. The young men prance about, peeping above their blankets and choosing the girls with whom they want to dance, then suddenly they dart forward and capture their chosen ones by throwing the blanket over their heads.

Frequently wives are picked in that way. If the girl does not care to be married away like this, she is free to kick the young man on the shins or break away.

"I have heard many white women complain of the way Indian women are treated," said the young man. "I admit they do most of the work, carrying the water, cooking and making clothes, but long before the white woman had any rights at all, all our women were a power in the council. No laws can be made or broken without their consent. They own everything in the home and if an Indian woman wants a divorce, all she has to do is place a stick against the teepee flap and the brave has to go home to mother."
