PROMINENT OREGON PIONEER DIES AT 95

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8 (UP)—George Henry Himes, 95, one of Oregon's most colorful pioneers and since 1898 curator of the Oregon Historical society, died Saturday at the Coffey hospital.

He was believed to have been Oregon's oldest living member of the Masonic lodge, having joined November 26, 1866. For 53 years he was secretary of the Oregon Pioneer association. A Portland city park and a forest service camp ground were named in his honor. The first Congregational church of which he was a member observed his birthday annually.

He is survived by five daughters, 15 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. He had five younger brothers and sisters but survived them all.

Born in Troy county, Pa., Himes came to the northwest, as a boy, with a wagon train with a six-year lay-over in Illinois. He has said that he walked nearly the entire distance because he could "see things better."

He became a printer in Olympia, Wash., where he started a diary that grew to 40 volumes and is famous in pioneer circles. He later worked for the Oregonian in Portland and owned a printing shop of his own. He retired as a printer in 1898.

His wife, Anna, whom he married in Salem in 1866, died here in 1933.

FIRST LADY BESTS MARY PICKFORD IN FILM ACTING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (UP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt presided tonight over ceremonies inaugurating the seventh campaign for funds for the national foundation for infantile paralysis and during the course of events she won an acclaim that has come to few, if any, women.

Her performance before the Kleig lights and cameras recording the ceremonies was such that she drew from a faltering Mary Pickford, one-time queen of the cinema and America's sweetheart, the comment:

"You're a better actress than I am, Mrs. Roosevelt."

Miss Pickford had just experienced the embarrassment of having to have a retake of the new reel film. Miss Dorothy Thompson, the columnist, likewise had to have a retake. Mrs. Roosevelt began and finished the picture and she was in the picture.

The movie will be used in the campaign to gather funds for the infantile paralysis campaign. It was filmed at the White House before an audience of 30. Mrs. Roosevelt wore a long gold metal cloth dress cut in simple lines. Miss Pickford was in brown with a ruby fox fur cape. Miss Thompson wore black with a gray astrakhan fur hat.

During the afternoon Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Thompson, Miss Pickford, Mrs. Cordell Hull, Mrs. Charles Edison, Mrs. Henry A. Wallace, Mrs. Charles Evans Hughes and Mrs. Stanley Forman Reed, wife of the associate justice of the supreme court, discussed the campaign over a national broadcasting company network.

Mrs. Roosevelt was guest of honor tonight at a dinner at which Basil O'Connor, president of the foundation, called for "thousands and thousands of dollars" to continue experimentation and treatment of poliomyelitis sufferers.

Lost his nightshirt at The Dalles.

Such are the records, raw bits of northwest history and personalities, left by Reed in a huge collection of papers and letters unearthed at the Portland college bearing his name.

Dorothy O. Johansen, Reed college history instructor who is directing cataloging and indexing the documents, revealed the papers, long sought by college officials, were found beneath a false floor in the chemistry building.

The papers cover the period between 1852-1905, beginning with the intimate story of the early years of the Oregon Steam and Navigation company. The company provided the Columbia river's first efficient transportation and brought a fortune to Reed.

Reed wrote also of his part in the struggle over railroads to California, the fight for a transcontinental road, the rapid industrial development of Oregon with the advent of such men as Jay Cook and

Henry Villard, his attempt to encourage scientific farming.

He headed ten transportation companies. In mining, he headed three other concerns, including the Bunker Hill and Sullivan companies.

The papers reveal Reed sent a laundress double the amount of her bill although protesting he had paid it. He demanded a "receipt for the sum indicated."

A commission agent charged one per cent commission on \$250 "spent for postage." Reed ordered a carriage upholstered in red leather with gilt trimmings.

Jay Cook couldn't pay \$5000 for steel rails delivered at Klamath, William S. Ladd telegraphed Reed, then in New York, that he needed \$100,000 to save the Ladd and Tilton Bank of Portland. Henry Villard wrote of a "flurry" in the stock market. A month later the "flurry" had ruined Villard.

Reed's desire to use water power developed for the ill-fated Oregon Iron and Steel company led to consideration of the electrification of Portland's street railway system. This resulted in his attempt to get Stephen Dudley Field and Thomas A. Edison to work together in perfecting a dynamo for streetcar use. Reed provided \$25,000 for the inventors and organized the electric railways of the United States.

Of the nightshirt, Reed wrote, seriously, that he had lost it on a trip to The Dalles.

The 1940 congress is now in session, and among the many bills coming up for consideration are a number looking toward social security and the betterment of living conditions for our citizens.

One of these bills is the proposed measure introduced in the last regular session by Senator Homer T. Bone of Washington. The measure, known as S. 1885, is scheduled for an early hearing.

In effect it will prevent profiteering in time of war should the United States become engaged in hostilities. This bill is being sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

Contrary to certain anti-veteran propaganda the VFW has never sponsored the idea of pensions for all veterans.

The major objective of the VFW legislative program is care for the DISABLED veteran and his widow and orphan.

There are today many thousands of disabled veterans being cared for by public and private charity in their respective communities. This burden is unfair to, and works a hardship on those communities. Many of our disabled comrades are living in states where climatic conditions are favorable to the treatment of their ailments or disabilities. Many veterans have thus become a burden on strange communities.

When our government assumes the full responsibility of caring for those unfortunates it will be a long step in the right direction.

This will relieve the state or community in which he happens to live of the burden of looking out for his welfare.

And much of the so-called "veterans' legislation" to be introduced in the new congress has that purpose as its real objective.
