COLUMBIA UNIONS WIDEN IWA SPLIT

PORTLAND, Jan. 8 (AP)—The rift between the Columbia river district council, International Woodworkers of America, CIO, and the faction led by President Harold Pritchett was widened yesterday when the council's urging that its 33 locals suspend per capita payments to the international. Some Portland officials predicted the action might be the wedge that will complete the division of the two IWA factions and its local back into the American Federation of Labor. The council left the AFL three years ago and subsequently affiliated with the CIO. Council President Al Hartung said the suspension was suggested as a protest to the reelection as international president of Pritchett. The council led a fight against Pritchett and his administration during the autumn convention at Klamath Falls, charging him with communistic leanings. Hartung stated a protest resolution had been filed with the IWA executive board against conduct of the election. It asked a reply within 48 hours of the board's meeting at Seattle January 11-12. The international union could outlaw the council and its locals for not making the per capita payments.

RALLY TRY BY STOCK LEADERS FAILS TO TAKE

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (AP)—Stock market leaders tried to follow a selective specialty rally today but the majority lacked driving power at any time. Top marks were reduced or replaced with declines in many cases at the close. With the ticker tape frequently at a standstill, transfers for the five hours approximated 700,000 shares. Buying of so-called investment type stocks again served as a stabilizing influence, brokers said, although continuance of speculative inertia was a handicap. The disposition of most was to await a cue from congress. While business happenings were cheering, predictions of a substantial letdown in the near future were plentiful in financial quarters.

MOISTURE REPORTS SHRINK WHEAT BIDS

CHICAGO, Jan. 8 (AP)—After dropping as much as 1 1/2 cents a bushel, due to selling inspired partly by the improved grain belt moisture situation, wheat prices developed some recovery power today. Losses were substantially reduced at times but closing figures were only fractionally lower than Saturday. Some buying on the recovery was attributed to lifting of hedges in connection with government purchase of 299,850 barrels of graham flour for relief distribution the next few months. This is equivalent to approximately 1,000,000 bushels of wheat. Although prices and bidders were not announced, grain men said graham flour is usually made from either spring or winter hard wheat. Wheat closed 1/2c lower than Saturday, May 59-59 1/2c, July 59-59 1/2c; Oats 1/2c down to 4 1/2c higher.

RAINS BRIGHTEN FUTURE OUTLOOK FOR OREGON WOOL

BURNS, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP)—Rains throughout the eastern Oregon and Idaho ranges have brightened the immediate future for wool growers, delegates to the Oregon Wool Growers' association convention said today. Early registration promised near-record attendance at the convention which lasts through Tuesday and attracts growers from Oregon, Idaho and parts of Washington. Concern was voiced over reduction of permits, shortening of grazing season and withdrawal of parts of national lands from grazing.
