

OREGON SCHOOL COSTS RISE AS ROLLS DECLINE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8 (UP)—Oregon's public schools cost \$18,859,990 to operate during 1938-39, exclusive of debt service, state superintendent Rex Putnam said today. The figure compared with \$17,663,167 for the preceding school year.

While costs mounted, total enrollment and the number of teachers declined.

The superintendent's figures were compiled from data furnished by county school heads.

The report also included:

Per capita cost for high schools increased from \$106.77 for 1937-38 to \$109.62 for 1938-39; grade schools increased from \$90.34 to \$94.

Aggregate bonded debt of the state system was reduced from \$115,955,000 to \$114,627,954; outstanding warrants declined from \$1,484,679 to \$1,258,957.79.

Total enrollment dropped from 210,219 to 207,546; elementary enrollment dropped from 148,715 to 144,749; high school enrollment gained from 62,063 to 62,752.

The number of teachers dropped from 7177 to 7054 in all schools; elementary teachers declined in numbers from 4851 to 4693; junior high school teachers increased from 225 to 337, and high school instructors from 2001 to 2024.

Transportation was provided in 955 buses for 31,900 pupils during 1938-39 compared with 870 buses and 26,480 pupils the preceding year. About a third of the buses were owned by school districts; the remainder were operated under contract.

INTEREST SHOWN IN CENSUS JOBS

Katherine G. Nelson, district census supervisor, has again made public a statement that applicants for positions as census enumerators should write to the census headquarters in Bend for blanks and information.

"Growing Up With Our Children" is the name of the series being discussed this year and character education will be the topic for Wednesday's meeting.

PLANE TRANSPORT REPORTS GREATEST YEAR IN HISTORY

CHICAGO, Jan. 8 (AP)—The Air Transport association of America reported today 1939 was the biggest and safest year in the history of the air transport industry.

President Edgar S. Gorrell estimated the airlines had flown 850,000,000 passenger miles, an increase of nearly 40 per cent over the 635,000,000 miles in 1938. Employment rose 22 per cent during the year.

He said more than 13,000,000 pounds of express were carried in 1939 as compared with 9,452,600 in 1938, and mail postage increased from 23,500,000 in 1938 to more than 27,000,000 last year.

More than 60 per cent of the 1939 revenue was from passenger traffic, whereas five years ago airline revenue was 70 per cent from mail business and 30 per cent from passengers, express and all other sources.

Gorrell said that on Dec. 31, the domestic airlines completed 620,000,000 passenger miles, or 67,000,000 plane miles, and the carriage of 1,400,000 passengers without injury to any person. This represented an increase of more than 400 per cent in passenger miles per passenger fatality, compared with the 1936-1938 three-year average.

STATE'S SHARE OF FEDERAL HIGHWAY FUNDS LARGER

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6 (UP)—Henry F. Cabell, chairman of the Oregon state highway commission, said today that Oregon will share in federal road funds to the extent of \$2,595,000 during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1940.

The state received \$2,170,141 for the current fiscal year.

Of the sum for next year, \$1,884,000 will go in to regular federal aid channels, \$245,000 for secondary highways, \$335,000 for grade separation and \$129,200 for public lands roads.

LULLABY WRITER DIES IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Funeral plans were made today for Mrs. Effie Canning Carlton, whose melody to the lullaby "Rock-A-Bye, Baby," has been a children's sandman song for more than a half century.

The body was turned over to an undertaker after it was claimed by James O. Marshall, of Lansdowne, Pa., whose relationship was not disclosed.

Mrs. Carlton, a former actress, died yesterday, apparently impoverished, in a city hospital room provided by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers. Victim of a cerebral hemorrhage suffered several days ago, Mrs. Carlton was about 84 years old.

She composed the melody to the Old Mother Goose rhyme while lulling to sleep the restless child of a neighbor, took it to a Boston music publisher at her teacher's suggestion, had it snapped up as a find. A few months after the song had been copyrighted, sales ran to \$20,000, and before the publisher died more than 300,000 copies had been sold.

The copyright was renewed but was allowed to lapse when the music publishing house changed hands. Investigation by the American Society of Composers disclosed the composer had received few royalties.

ANTELOPE HEARING SET IN FEBRUARY
