

BOARD MAKES PLANS TO AID FINN RELIEF

Residents of Klamath county joined other parts of the nation in voting its sympathy with Finland and plans to raise money for the Finnish relief fund were made at the first meeting of the committee held Monday night in the office of Mayor Clifton Richmond.

C. E. Carlson, chairman, conducted the meeting and tentative plans were made for a benefit movie performance, the date to be announced later by Mrs. Rose Poole, member of the committee, and a benefit dance to be given in the Klamath Falls armory the night of Saturday, February 10.

The first donation to the Klamath Falls fund was accepted by Carlson Monday night when a \$10 check was received from the Order of Vasa.

All Scandinavian orders in the county, it is understood, are sympathetic toward the movement and various smaller affairs are being planned to make the Klamath donation one of the largest and most generous in the state.

All persons wishing to make donations to the Finnish relief fund may do so through C. S. Robertson, named secretary and treasurer of the committee.

A second meeting of the committee is scheduled for Monday, January 15, at 7 p. m. in the mayor's office. At that time final details will be worked out for the benefit movie and dance.

JAIL ENDS WAVE OF AUTO CRIMES

Melvin Brown, pretty Indian, was committed to the county jail Monday by Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney for a term of 125 days, bringing to a climax a mild one-man crime wave consisting largely of traffic violations.

The sentence was handed out on three separate counts, which overlapped in a series of offenses requiring considerable research to ascertain the various automatic license suspensions involved.

On December 19, Brown, who claims to be a Klamath Indian from California, was arrested for assault and battery and given a sentence of 12 and a half days or a fine of \$25. A woman came to the court room and paid \$5 of the fine, promising the rest soon, but as it was a long time in coming Justice Mahoney committed Brown to jail for 10 days in lieu of the cash.

In apprehending Brown January 2 state officers arrested him for reckless driving, whereupon he gave his name as one Lester Jefferson. He was also charged with operating a motor vehicle without a driver's license, the permit having been revoked for an offense committed September 21, 1939.

An investigation of the monthly bulletin published by the state of Oregon on revoked and suspended licenses showed that the act committed on that date consisted again of operating a motor vehicle without a driver's permit.

Ironically, the license revocation would have expired in one more day, for it was on the same date of the previous year that he had been arrested and hailed into court at Chiloquin on a reckless driving count.

Brown began the cumulative sentence Monday.

RAINFALL FAR OVER NORMAL FOR REGION

A generous downpour from Ol' Jupe Pluvius' rainbucket Monday night sent the total precipitation for the stream year up to 7.55 inches since October 1, 1939. This total sends the year up among the five heaviest precipitation years since records were kept by the US reclamation service here.

Normal precipitation is 5.09 inches, and last year the record shows but 4.43 inches, one reason why 1939 was one of the driest on record.

Residents of the basin area are used to plenty of precipitation but mostly in snow form at this time of the year. Minimum temperature reported this morning was 32 degrees, maximum temperature Monday was 46 degrees.
