ALTURAS — Democrats from all parts of Modoc county attended a Jackson day dinner here Monday evening.

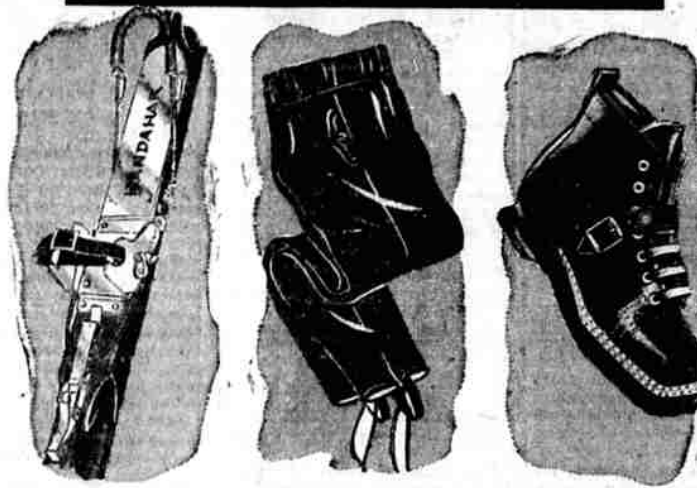

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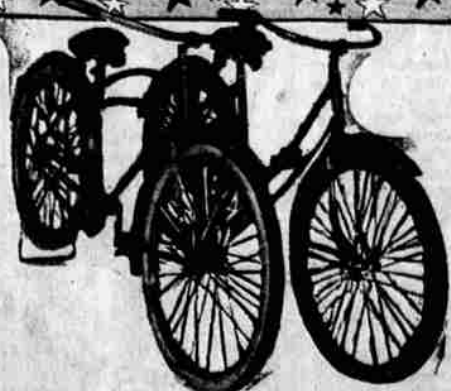
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
