COUNCIL EYES SEWER PLANS, SUMP PROJECT

TULELAKE—An informal discussion of the pending installation of water and sewer systems, of the pressing need for immediate action by congress on an appropriation for relief of the flood situation in the sump area and a report by Councilman A. A. Rodenberger, chairman of the committee which in the past few weeks has circulated petitions relative to the need, over Siskiyou and Klamath counties, occupied time of the council in session Monday night.

Harold Roath, city clerk, on vacation in the middle west who en route home will contact Attorney Postlethwaite, San Francisco, relative to progress being made on plans for installation of the projects did not intend to give his report to the council at this week's session.

Councilman Otis Roper, in San Francisco and Los Angeles on a two week's vacation, will also contact Postlethwaite and Edward E. Husey, city engineer, for information.

The council accepted with gratitude a location northeast of Stronghold offered and surveyed by the reclamation bureau for a site for a new city dump that will be accessible in all kinds of weather. Wet weather this winter has made impassable the road to the original site.

A delegation of Tulelake residents will visit Alturas this week to obtain signatures of city officials and residents on petitions to be forwarded to Washington, asking for action on the sump situation.

The council voted to allow minor repairs on the city's sprinkler truck.

LIQUOR PERMIT AWAITS FLOORING
