BUYING URGE STOPS SLUMP ON EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP)—Leading issues flirited with difficulties in today's stock market but a final hour desire to buy put many leaders up fractionally.

Near the finish, steels, motors and aircraft, especially, led a minor advance. Transfers approximated 600,000 shares.

Brokers said the late turnabout was due to short covering brought forth by the fact offerings were driving up and that what had looked like a retreat in the morning didn't go far enough to satisfy those who had been pessimistic over the market's route for the next few weeks.

Foreign prices were inclined a little lower.

Buyers who were making bids on sizeable weights offered prices that were unacceptable to holders.

WHEAT TAKES WIDE SWING IN PRICES

CHICAGO, Jan. 10 (AP)—Rapid and fairly wide price swings characterized the wheat pit today with values closing near the day's best levels. Fluctuations were within a range of about 2 cents.

Firmness at Winnipeg, where gains of better than a cent were scored, an increased buying at the decline here erased early losses of about a cent and replaced them with corresponding gains. Increased war activity contributed to the upturn, which, however, was held in check much of the time by more favorable domestic crop reports.

Wheat on the board of trade closed 1-1/2c higher, May \$1.02-1.03; July 99 1/2c; corn 1-1/2c down, May 55-55 1/2c, July 53 1/2c; oats 1c higher.
