Oregon Sports Notes

December basketball will not be the University of Oregon another tidy roll, Coach Howard Hobson reported to the exchequer at Eugene recently. The returns aren't all in yet but Hobson struck a few averages. The barnstorming journey from Portland to New York brought about \$3000 to the Oregon treasurer in guarantees and percentage of gate receipts. The tour cost about \$5000.

Until Oregon became a nomad, December basketball was a dead loss. Dick Stritt in the Eugene Register Guard said it cost about \$400 and the receipts were trivial. Hobson led Oregon basketball from a \$400 December deficit to a \$4000 profit in three years and put the school in the headlines.

He has another invitation to play in Madison Square garden next winter, but is not willing to risk hard-won privileges by putting an indifferent team in the garden. "We'll wait and see what sort of an outfit we can expect next year before we give 'em a final answer," he said.

Hobson considers the profits only part of the benefits of long-distance basketball. He listed to Stritt other items of usefulness.

NEGLEY SELLS BUSINESS TO TULELAKE TRIO

TULELAKE—One of the largest business transfers recorded here in several years went into effect January 1 when Floyd A. Boyd, manager of the Tulelake branch of the J. T. Negley implement company, Alturas, became co-owner of the business with Ival Wolfe and Ivan Rose, both well known Tulelake ranchers. Boyd has been manager of the local concern since March, 1933, and has been affiliated with a Negley company in various capacities for fifteen years.

The new firm will be known as the Floyd A. Boyd company and the company will continue to handle nationally known lines of equipment including International trucks, McCormick-Deering farm machinery and Frigidaire household appliances.

The firm, third oldest in the city, will make no immediate change in personnel or in the buildings also incorporated in the change of ownership.

Boyd, since his residence here, has been active in community affairs, has served as president of the 20-30 club, is a member of the Tulelake Rotary club, the chamber of commerce, and since organization of the volunteer fire department has served as chief.

Rose and Wolfe were among the first homesteaders to settle in the basin.

Consideration of the transaction was not announced.

WOOLGROWERS MEET AT BURNS

LAKEVIEW—Lake county furnished the largest delegation of any county in Oregon at the annual convention of the Oregon Woolgrowers association, which opened Monday in Burns. Twenty-four Lake county producers and a strong delegation of Lakeview business men were present. The annual report of Secretary Walter Holt revealed that the Woolgrowers association has more members in Lake county than in any other county in Oregon.

One of the resolutions adopted by the convention was the proposal that a substantial portion of the hunting license fees received by the state be distributed among the counties to be placed in the general fund in order to ease the real property tax burden. The sponsors of the resolution which originated in Grant county contended that the deer, elk and antelope not only range on private property but also eat and scavenge for which the live stock producers pay substantial grazing fees to the forest service and the grazing service.

LITTLE DROP IN TRAFFIC VIOLATION HERE REPORTED

Despite the continued use of "fixies" traffic tickets, police officers observed Thursday that there has been little let-up, if any, in the disregard for traffic laws as outlined by the city fathers.

During the past weeks a score or more of warrants have been issued by Police Judge Carl Cook and served by police officers on motorists who have failed to meet the red tickets on their automobiles. Each offender, when served with a warrant, is taxed \$2 instead of the customary \$1. Twelve offenders paid \$1 each into the city coffers Thursday morning, and three paid \$2 on warrants.

Lawrence Murphy, taxi driver, paid a \$1 badge fee. Three drunks appeared in police court Thursday.

It is estimated that automotive taxes this year will total about \$1,600,000.00.
