

CONTRACTS FOR KLAMATH JOBS LET BY BOARD

Contracts on two Klamath county projects have been awarded by the highway commission, and two others have been referred to the state highway engineer, with power to award as soon as he has checked the bids.

Contracts awarded: Deschutes and Klamath counties—Grading 4.45 miles, surfacing and cutting 12.9 miles of La Pine-West Forest boundary section of Fremont highway, E. L. Rigdon, Prairie City, \$59,579.

Klamath county—Furnish crushed rock for Chemult-Fort Klamath section of The Dalles-California highway, Rogers Construction company, Dayton, Wash., \$23,700.

Bids referred to the state engineer: Klamath county—Grading, surfacing and road mix cutting, 92 of a mile of the Lost river section of Klamath Falls-Malin highway, W. D. Miller Construction company, Klamath Falls, \$19,252.

Klamath county—Constructing 130-foot concrete viaduct over Lost river and concrete siphon of Klamath Falls-Malin highway, W. D. Miller Construction company, Klamath Falls, \$13,327.

WEATHER COLDEST SINCE NEW YEAR'S

BALENTINE IN CONTEST FOR RE-ELECTION

State Senator U. S. Balentine announced Friday he would seek re-election in the forthcoming political campaigns.

Balentine, a republican, will enter the republican primary in May. The seventeenth senatorial district, which he has represented for one term in the senate, includes Klamath, Lake, Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson counties.

The senator made this statement to the voters of this district: "I desire to announce my intention to seek re-election to the state senate of the State of Oregon, in this district. I make this announcement of my intention at this early date for the reason that as incumbent of the office, my constituents are entitled to sufficient time to review my record as their public servant in the state senate, and to this record I direct your attention, and invite your closest scrutiny."

"The five counties comprising this district are dependant almost entirely upon lumbering and agriculture, and as the representative of this district the problems of the farmers and the timber working men have been my problem, and a great deal of my time and effort has been devoted toward the progressive solution of their problem. Beneficial legislation for the farmer and working man is a long time program, and while I feel much has been accomplished there is yet a great deal to be done, and I feel that my legislative experience equips me to carry on the battles in behalf of the people of this district with some assurance of beneficial results."

FORCE INADEQUATE TO DEAL WITH SPY MENACE, CLAIM

PORTLAND, Jan. 12 (AP)—Inadequate laws make it difficult to deal with spies who are now in

every American airplane factory, shipyard and armament plant, Leon Turrou said yesterday.

Turrou, former FBI agent who aided in the arrest of Nazi agents in New York, said an increased force of FBI agents was needed to combat the spy menace.

When war orders are completed in this country for Britain and France, there will be a wave of sabotage, he predicted.

"Our citizens do not seem to realize that these foreign agents ... are not only working throughout the mainland, but are very active along the Panama canal and in the Hawaiian Islands," he said.

The former G-man added that a large force should be trained for counter-espionage, because "army and navy intelligence services cannot cope with the problem."

IWA INSTALLS NEW OFFICERS, TAKES TIME FOR FUNERAL

SEATTLE, Jan. 12 (AP)—The international executive board of the International Woodworkers of America, opening a mid-winter conference here last night, answered the Columbia river district council's protest over the reelection of Harold J. Pritchett as president by installing Pritchett and all other officers.

The officers were elected at a recent referendum election.

The Oregon council last week recommended to its 33 locals that they suspend per capita payments as a protest.

The board planned to recess its session today until tomorrow so that members could attend the funeral of Mrs. Dick Law in Aberdeen. Mrs. Law, wife of a CIO union leader in Aberdeen, was slain last week.
