C. S. Robertson, chairman of the membership committee stated that progress was being made to obtain the 1500 members necessary to raise the \$1500 that is Klamath Falls' guarantee of interest in securing the \$6000 allotment from the federal government, for the new civic art center.

Membership in the Art Center association of Klamath Falls is open to all persons in the vicinity. Members are desired in all the nearby towns and representatives are appointed in Chiloquin, Keno, Altona, Modoc Point, Fort Klamath, Pelican City, Henley, Merrill, Bonanza, Sprague River and Tulelake, Calif., from whom such membership may be procured.

All persons joining this year become charter members of the organization. Membership will permit attendance in the association meetings and a voice in the proceedings. Yearly membership dues are \$1.00, "contributing membership" is \$5.00 and "sponsoring membership" is \$25.

John Houston is chairman of the finance committee and has opened an account at the bank in the name of the K. F. Art Center association in which funds that are already coming in, are being placed. The moment this account reaches the required amount of \$1500 work will be commenced on renovating a building suitable to the requirements of the art center.

SERVICE CLUB SIGNS SOON TO BE IN PLACE

Anthony R. Manno, trustee for the Klamath Falls 20-30 club, received word Friday from H. B. Glaisyer, secretary of the Oregon state highway commission that service club racks will be installed as soon as they can be prepared.

The seven service clubs of the city whose names will appear on the rack include the 20-30 club, Lions, Rotary, Kiwanis, Business and Professional Women's club, Junior chamber of commerce and Soroptimist.

Glaisyer in his letter: "When I last wrote you the state highway commission was not prepared to order the immediate installation of these racks and has had the matter under discussion at a couple of meetings since then, the last time being at its meeting on December 20 when the commission ordered certain modifications in the previous setup and certain restrictions, the principal ones being as follows:

"Each rack is to be limited to seven panels and representation on the rack is limited to the following organizations, national service clubs, patriotic organizations and chambers of commerce.

"The commission has limited the installation to cities and towns of 1000 population or over.

"The arrangement of the organizations on the rack is to be determined by mutual agreement of such organizations."

Manno stated Friday the racks would be placed at the three entrances into the city, the Crater Lake highway, the Lakeview highway and the Greensprings highway.
