For evening, long bobs are fluffed in plump ringlets, dangling on the neckline or caught together in a chignon-like cluster on the back of the head. The majority are swept backward away from the face, of course, but some hang straight down and turn out to be ultra-flattering to the very thin or very long face.

When curls are allowed to hang straight down all the way around, hair on top of the head is smooth and unwarped. The girl under twenty might wear velvet bows high on the two curls nearest her face.

The soft look prevails so far as the daytime mode is concerned. Few and far between are women who wear their hair severely brushed upward this year. There's nothing mannish about very short, shingled effects. They are shaped rather than clipped.

EXPERT SAYS STATE HOSPITALS NO CURE FOR DRUNKENNESS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12 (UP)

Dr. P. P. Pollak, resident physician at San Francisco hospital and formerly at Agnew State hospital, today testified in an interperence commitment suit that state institutions offer no cure for alcoholism.

Pollak was a defense witness for Mrs. Ann Marie Kittermann Herrick, 31-year-old heiress "who is fighting attempts of her family to commit her to a state institution on grounds of intemperance."

"Less than 10 per cent of the persons admitted for alcoholism treatment are permanently benefited," Pollak told the court.

The doctor said he had treated Mrs. Herrick on three occasions in the San Francisco hospital psychopathic ward, and he believed her drinking was "the result of a neurosis rather than an acute cause of it."

He said she suffered from "hysterical paralysis and hysterical blindness," but neither was due to drinking.
