Indian Interpreter To Appear Monday In Auditorium

Here is an interesting excerpt from the St. Louis Post-Dispatch about Charles Eagle Plume, America's foremost Indian dancer and noted interpreter of Indian culture and folklore, who will appear here on January the fifteenth in the auditorium of the public library, presented by Klamath Falls Women's Library club.

"Eagle Plume, 22-year-old Blackfoot Indian, has come to St. Louis this month to present the wild, beautiful dances of his people. His costumes are authentic, down to the beaded design on his moccasins, every step of his dance is studied and true. These dances are not a flight from boredom as are our ballroom dances, but an out-pouring of spirit to the Indian's god.

"When Eagle Plume sings as he dances, the notes seem weird, and in a minor key. But that is because their scale is based on quarter notes. Once heard in the mountains or on the plains, Indian music is unforgettable.

"When I first listened to your songs, 'St. Louis Blues' and 'Minnie, the Moocher,' I was startled," he said, "for they sounded strange to me." A graduate from the College of Colorado, he is a member of the Pikuni tribe of Blackfoot, whose reservation is in Montana. His grandfather, White Weasel, was a famous chief. Eagle Plume has some white blood which accounts for his blue eyes, which contrast so vividly with his copper skin. Above medium height, slender, he has the high cheek-bones, high bridged nose and wide firm mouth, characteristic of his race. He speaks better English than most white people."
