

FINN BENEFIT SHOW SLATED FOR TUESDAY

Plans for the benefit performance of "Intermezzo," to be presented at the Pelican theatre Tuesday afternoon and evening for the Finnish relief fund, are complete. It was announced Monday by Mrs. Rose M. Poole of the Klamath theatre.

All money derived from the showing of the picture which stars the lovely Swedish actress, Ingrid Bergman, will be given to the relief fund. This includes revenue from the afternoon and two evening performances, Mrs. Poole stated.

In addition to seeing one of the best pictures of the year, the Gay Nineties orchestra will present a skit, "How Russia Won the War." Mrs. S. Meade Badger, of the city school staff, Scandinavian vocalist, will sing several numbers and students from the Ida Dorah Moldovan studio will be presented in numbers.

One interesting feature of "Intermezzo," in which the screen favorite Leslie Howard also appears, is the fact that Ingrid Bergman makes her American debut in the film world. Miss Bergman was seen here recently in an all Swedish film which Scandinavian residents enjoyed to the utmost.

The Finnish relief committee is working hard to make attendance at the theatre one of the largest in the history of the city as interest grows in the fund.

There will be no advance sale of tickets. However, the public is urged to attend one of the three performances.

CONVICTIONS HIGH IN OREGON COURTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The commerce department said today \$8.3 per cent of the defendants in major criminal cases in circuit courts of Oregon in 1938 were convicted.

Pleas of guilty accounted for disposition of most cases. It continued with only 9.3 per cent being disposed of by trial. Of 962 persons convicted \$91 pleaded guilty, courts held 67 guilty and juries convicted 67. The number was slightly larger than in the two preceding years.

In seven murder cases two defendants pleaded guilty and five were convicted by juries. In 11 manslaughter cases six pleaded guilty and five were convicted.

In 155 burglary cases 142 pleaded guilty, two were found guilty by judges and 11 convicted by juries. Of 79 automobile theft defendants 78 pleaded guilty and one was convicted by a jury. About 294 persons were charged with larceny but 17 cases were disposed of without trial, 268 pleaded guilty, one was found guilty by the court and 10 convicted by juries.

In the major cases one defendant was sentenced to death, 430 to the reformatory or prison, 855 were put on probation or given suspended sentence, 157 were sentenced to local jails, 14 fined only and five persons sent to juvenile institutions.

KLAMATH CREEK FREEZING SOLID

CLATSOP SUMMIT, Ore., Jan. 15 (AP)—For some unknown reason, the Trapper creek, which in former years has been usually free of ice due to its swiftness, has been freezing this year from the bottom up. It is almost frozen over.

Old Man Winter put the new Summit lodge hydro-electric plant out of order for three days. The flame, built to carry water from Trapper creek to the plant, froze solid.

It is a regrettable fact that there are still many thousands of veterans of the Spanish-American and World wars who have never affiliated themselves with any veteran's organization. This is hard to understand when one takes into consideration the many benefits to be derived by membership in such an organization as the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States.

There is no record of any worthwhile laws for the benefit of disabled veterans and their dependents passed during the past 40 years that have not been promoted or sponsored by the VFW.

One of the major objectives of the VFW legislative program at this time is to put the World War veteran on an equal footing with veterans of the Spanish-American war in the matter of pensions.

Just why so many eligible veterans are willing to sit back and let the organization carry the entire load of veteran welfare is a question that admits of but one logical answer: They are not aware of the many advantages to be derived by belonging to their local post.

The social side of the VFW is well worth the small amount required as dues. Each post maintains a service officer whose duty it is to look after any member who happens to be in need of assistance either through sickness or from any other cause. In case hospitalization is required, the service officer is always on the job to render assistance in getting the member into veterans' hospital for free treatment. He is also willing and ready to assist in the preparation and filing of papers relative to veterans' benefits, and renders many other services for which there is absolutely no charge.

The eligible veteran who has not already availed himself of the privilege of membership in the VFW will do well to "come up and see us sometime." There will be a district meeting held in the KC hall next Sunday, January 21. Delegations from Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass posts, which are also included in district No. 8, will be present. District Commander Burras, formerly of Ashland but now living in Klamath Falls, will preside. A dinner will be served at 12 noon.

Eligible veterans who are not members of the post, as well as visiting members are invited to attend this dinner. And the dinner is free.

The business meeting will follow the dinner. So, buddies, come and show the visitors something.

Next regular meeting of the post will be Thursday evening, Jan. 18, KC hall, "over the Rainbow."

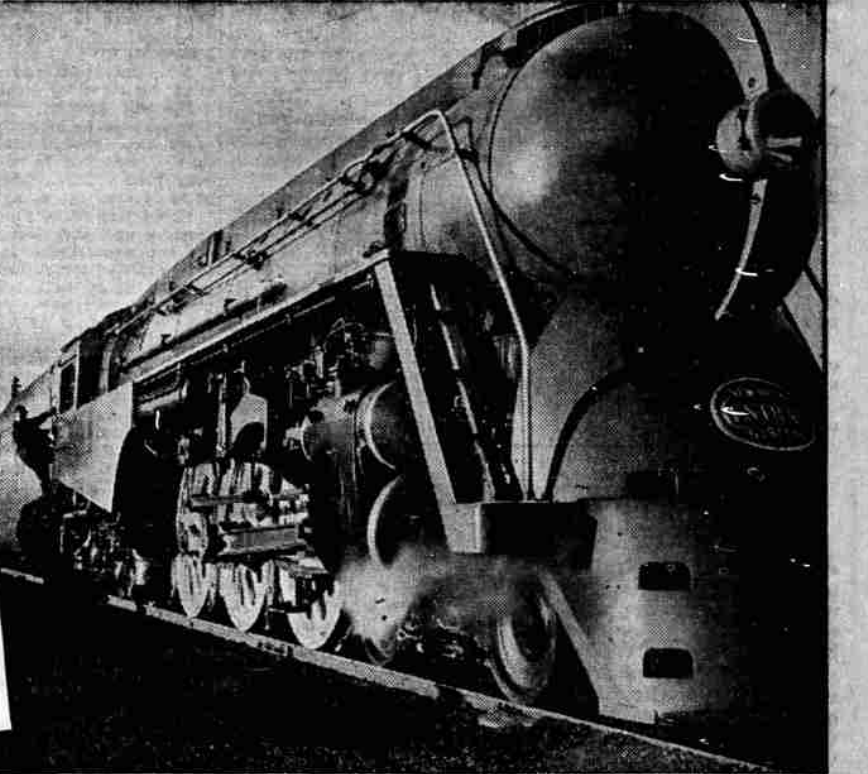

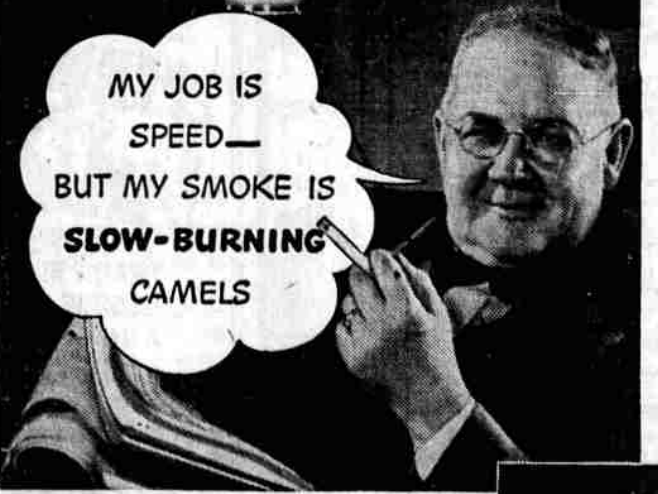
