JUDGE CONTEST DRAWS ENTRY OF A. C. YADEN

A pledge for harmony in public office is emphasized in the announcement of A. C. Yaden for the office of circuit judge of the 13th judicial district, comprising Klamath county.

Attorney Yaden filed his declaration of candidacy with the secretary of state Tuesday. He will qualify as a candidate by petition.

His statement in full follows: To the Voters of Klamath County, Oregon: In announcing my candidacy for Judge of the Circuit Court of Klamath County, Oregon, on the nonpartisan ballot, I submit myself to and invite the very closest inquiry into my fitness for the office.

I am 52 years old. Born in Kentucky, I moved to Oregon in 1901, and have resided in Klamath county for 38 years. I have a family of wife, three children and one grandchild. I have had 23 years active practice of law at Klamath Falls and in the State Supreme Court. I have had six years experience as Referee in Bankruptcy for Klamath and Lake counties—the equivalent of six years actual experience as a Judge.

If selected as Judge, I will be a Judge for all—not a part. I am liberal enough to be tolerant and conservative enough to be honest. I will not scatter my endeavor to fields which are entirely foreign to the office of Circuit Judge. Under our American system it is deemed dangerous to rest too much power in one man. That is why you elect a sheriff, a district attorney and other officers to aid in carrying out the governmental work. I shall respect your selections—otherwise we would no longer have a democracy. You are entitled to harmonious co-operation by your officials, rather than discord and strife. I have worked 23 years in harmony with your selections and shall thus continue. These are not the times to build on dissent, but to harmonize to the end the American fundamentals shall be kept in the ascendancy. It is by harmonious action that we can best secure that respect and obedience to the law that is desired.

I am not a stranger to the problems and perplexities of the man who earns his living by manual labor, as I worked at carpentry before admission to the bar in raising my family and have brought into and use in the practice of law the honesty and dignity of simple labor. Fairness and impartiality are attributes of a Judge that are prime essentials. I am particularly fitted in this respect, owing to my lack of affiliation with any club, lodge, sect, clique or other organization.

Above all, if selected as Judge, I shall never use that high and responsible office and position of trust to sow the seeds of hate, abuse, discord and prejudice against those who might be opposed to me or with whom I might differ in opinion; and I shall ever follow the law and remember that all accused of crime are presumed innocent till proven guilty, lest I endanger the very fundamental American doctrine that all accused of crime are entitled to a fair and impartial trial before a jury of their fellow citizens.

As to me, the one simple issue is, "Do you want me as your Judge?" I am not asking—

JURYMEN INSPECT SCENE OF DISPUTE

Trial of the case of Johnson versus Lamm et al proceeded rapidly in circuit court Tuesday, with Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay on the bench and only 11 jurors in the box. Attorneys on both sides stipulated to permit the trial of the case by 11 jurors after the panels had been exhausted.

Late Tuesday the jurors went on an inspection trip to view property involved in the suit. Circuit Judge Hay, following a policy he laid down in a previous trial here, insisted in a civil case that Klamath county be not required to pay the expenses of jurors on such trips.

Accompanying the jurors were Judge Hay, Attorney J. H. Carnahan and William Kuykendall, representing the plaintiff and defense, respectively, and Bailiff Robert Graham.

They visited the land near Mowich, Ore., owned by M. L. Johnson, local insurance man and plaintiff in the case where it is alleged in the complaint that timber which was valuable to the property as a potential summer resort, had been removed.

Defendants named in the case are W. E. Lamm and wife and Roland Watt, a co-partnership; and Deschutes Lumber company, a corporation.
