German cruiser Leipzig and another German cruiser with torpedoes.

Last night the British announced a salvo of bombs from a British plane was believed to have sunk a German submarine in the North sea.

A patch of grease and bubbles rose after the bombs were dropped, the announcement said.

The three submarines reported lost today raised the total of British naval vessels lost of which is admitted by the admiralty to 20, with a total tonnage of 79,128.

Known deaths in the sinkings total 1809, with at least 66 missing and believed dead. The greatest loss of life was on the battleship Royal Oak, where 810 were lost. Other high death tolls were on the aircraft carrier Courageous, 515, the armed merchantman Rawalpindi, 250, and the destroyer Duchess, 129.

50 PER CENT SLASH MADE IN DAIRY FEE

SALEM, Jan. 16 (AP)—Reduction in fees on grade A dairy licenses by at least 50 per cent was announced today by the state department of agriculture, the new rates to be retroactive to January 1.

The annual license will cost \$5 and will cover up to 10 cows in a herd. An additional 50 cents per cow will be charged for each cow over 10.

HAYDEN INSPECTS TULE LAKE DIKES IN FLOOD AREA

B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath project of the US reclamation service, left early Tuesday morning for the Tulelake district where he will look over the dikes in that section.

Hayden met Willard Smith, engineer in charge of the Tule lake division, and together they investigated conditions there.

Five homesteaders called at Hayden's office Monday to talk over the safety of the main reclamation dike. They also called at the chamber of commerce. Hayden assured them that the dike was safe, and as an added precaution CCC enrollees were busy graveling the dikes and rip-rapping the sides with heavy rock.

COLD SNAP BRINGS OUT SKATING FANS

Sub-freezing weather added to the pleasure of hundreds of skaters on Upper Klamath lake Monday evening and with a forecast of cold weather, continued skating is expected for several nights to come.

Sheriff Lloyd L. Low urged skaters to "stick close to the shore line where skating should be safe. The lake is treacherous in spots where the channels do not freeze over to sufficient depth to make skating possible."

A line of bonfires warmed a couple of hundred pairs of toes Monday night and several wieners roasts were in progress.

On a number of ponds throughout the suburban area youngsters were skating after school hours. Many of the little ponds were caused by heavy rainfall since the first of the year.

Minimum temperatures recorded Tuesday morning was 21 degrees, maximum by the mid-afternoon was 32 degrees. Maximum temperature Monday afternoon was 40 degrees.

Burns and Lakeview were the coldest spots in the state Tuesday morning, both reporting a minimum of 14 degrees.

EUGENE REJECTS BONNEVILLE POWER

EUGENE, Jan. 16 (AP)—The Eugene water board last night turned down Bonneville's contracts and decided to build its own "standby" power plant to serve the city. The plant will cost \$10,000 and will be completed within 18 months. Construction will be started immediately.

Because the water board's surveys showed that peak-load and stand-by power service would be cheaper and more practical with a steam plant than with a Bonneville source, Eugene will make no contract with the federal agency for the present, J. W. McArthur, superintendent, announced.

This action does not eliminate the possibility that in future years, Eugene may hook on to the Bonneville lines on some sort of exchange plan, whereby Eugene may help Bonneville in emergencies, and Bonneville would reciprocate to Eugene.

The water board's action settled a question of two years' standing. Several contracts have been offered to Eugene, and each has been to the subject for long and sometimes heated discussion. Eugene's decision to depend on its own resources apparently has settled for many years the problem of power supply.

AID AVAILABLE FOR FAMILY-SIZE FARMS

Farm security administration aid for Klamath and Lake county farm families whose operations are in jeopardy, is available through county FSA offices in the Federal building, Klamath Falls, reports Earl A. Gardner, local supervisor. Operators on family-sized farms whose livelihood is threatened by lack of adequate credit facilities or similar causes are eligible for FSA assistance.

Sufficient funds have been allotted to this district to provide for estimated needs of all handicapped farm families through FSA operating funds, livestock, feed and cooperative loans, as well as debt adjustment and supervisory services. Cooperative loans, as well as debt adjustment and supervisory services. Cooperative farm and home plans stressing business like management and production of home foods is the basis of each rehabilitation loan.

Farmers expecting to request aid for next year's operation are asked to file applications as soon as possible so plans can be completed this winter and facilities made available for the coming crop season.

Complete information as to the farm security program may be obtained at the Klamath Falls office in the Federal building, and applications can be filed from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Mondays and from 9 a. m. until noon Saturdays.

HIGH SCORES MADE IN ENGLISH EXAM

Howard Copeland and Nadine Poteet made only six errors out of a possible 350 to receive the highest scores in the senior semester English exam which was given at Klamath Union high school last week. The scores on the test, which is the equivalent of a college entrance examination, ran about the same as in past years with 6 as the minimum number of mistakes and 155 as the most. Of the 415 seniors who took the test the eleven highest were: Nadine Poteet, six errors; Howard Copeland, six; Earl Reynolds Jr., 7; Genevieve Smith, 8; Helen Olson, 9; Charlotte Wales, 10; and Patricia Ellis, James Zbinden, Phyllis Collier, Katherine Kelley, and Claude Summers with 12 mistakes apiece.

The test covered punctuation, spelling and correct usage of English.

Turkey for the purchase of armaments.

3. The position of Belgium and the Netherlands is "not enviable" and "they are undoubtedly wise to neglect to measure which may contribute to their security."

4. The Mediterranean area has happily been spared so far from suffer and the horror inseparable from war. "I trust," said Chamberlain, "that this will long continue."

5. "While there are as yet no definite indications that might warrant any optimistic forecast of a peaceful settlement in the near future, we have welcomed the recent action by the Japanese government in the direction of relaxing some of the restrictions (in China) which have from time to time caused difficulty and tension in relations with third powers."

The armament loan to Turkey was agreed upon late last October at conferences which paralleled the signing of the Turkish-British-French accord.

Chamberlain told commons Germany apparently is pursuing "a policy of deliberate depopulation" in Poland, and it appeared that intellectual leaders were being singled out for execution.

Leningrad, a city of 2,776,000, is about 50 miles southeast of this front.

The officer declined to speculate on the ultimate result of the Russians' transport difficulties but foreign observers familiar with peacetime difficulties suggested the question might be answered in the Finnish favor—just as the numbing cold has worked for the defenders elsewhere.

While by ordinary standings the 25 degrees below on the Karelian front might be considered a terrific handicap to military operations the hardships here by no means compare with those brought by the 40-below in the far north.

Finland is undergoing the coldest weather in 10 years.

With the Russian troops apparently largely busy digging in and trying to keep warm there was only desultory artillery fire yesterday. Meanwhile Finnish ski patrols were reported active at several points beyond the Russian border in the north.

The war seems to be settling down again to guerrilla combat and artillery duelling on the front lines and attempts by the Russian air force to crush civilian morale—as well as military targets—behind the fronts.

leader, who shouted in a voice heard outside the courtroom: "Not guilty!"

One of the group, George Kelly, 24, a hotel worker, expressed bewilderment at the G-men's charges, complaining: "I don't know whether I'm against communism or not. I don't know what it's all about."

J. Edgar Hoover, FBI chief, said he had evidence to support every jot of the charge that a conspiracy was aimed at establishing a dictatorship.

"It took only 23 men to overthrow Russia," Hoover reminded skeptics.

Meanwhile, residents at Newark, N. Y., where FBI agents said they spied on the alleged conspirators while they were at rifle practice, recalled having seen a group of 10 or 12 strangers at a nearby range and commented that their marksmanship was "awful."

The American Civil Liberties union last night telegraphed Senator Morris Sheppard, chairman of the senate military affairs committee, urging the committee favorably report a bill abolishing private military activities.

The bill, drawn by the union, was introduced by Rep. Hamilton Fish (R-N. Y.) in 1938.

Occupants of the apartment of Mrs. Childs, where the shooting occurred, said they heard the shots about 6 a. m., and found Mrs. Childs shot through the abdomen and Corsetto shot in the lung and in the abdomen. Corsetto died at a hospital, after Martin said he had admitted the shooting but gave no reason for it.

Seven of the persons indicted last week by the county grand jury were arraigned Monday before Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst. Only one of them entering a plea. Time for pleading for the other six was set at 10 a. m. next Monday.

Jack Martin, charged with forgery, entered a plea of not guilty and was committed to the county jail with bond set at \$1000.

The others, all of whom took time to plead, are: Earl Williams, manslaughter, committed with bond set at \$3000; Louis Taylor, rape, committed with bond set at \$3000; Sol Bly, operating a barber shop without a license, on own recognizance with bond of \$500; Harold Irwin Stillinger, larceny from an automobile, committed with bail set at \$1000; Claude Fray, threatening to commit a felony, committed with bond set at \$1000; George Baldwin, obtaining money by false pretenses, committed with bond set at \$1000.

An unusual incident occurred in connection with the arraignment of Sol Bly, charged with operating a barber shop without a state license. When Bly told Judge Ashurst that his attorney was David R. Vandenberg, the judge replied if that was the case he could do nothing for Bly because Vandenberg "always calls in another judge and it takes six or eight months" to settle such matters. Apparently he was referring to affidavits of prejudice, many of which are filed by various attorneys against Judge Ashurst.

Bly said he would get an attorney at Medford and Judge Ashurst said that in that case he would release him on his own recognizance to get the attorney and arrange \$500 bond.
