REPLACEMENTS ARRIVING TO FILL CCC AREA

TULELAKE — CCC replacements in the fourth and fifth corps area camps located in the south end are arriving to bring camp quotas up to normal status.

Camp Tulelake received 40 men the first of the week from Tennessee, who entrained at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, with 41 for Camp Klamath and like number for other camps of the area.

Lava Beds camp replacements will not arrive until some time next week when men recruited from Cincinnati and Cleveland, Ohio will arrive to fill vacancies in the fifth corps area. A total of 110 men will be received by Captain Bailey.

James A. Mercer, in command at Camp Klamath, who went east with retreating enrollees, was in command of the special trains bringing 388 Ohio boys into eastern Oregon for replacements in the fifth corps area. Lieutenant Thomas Crumble, of the Sacramento area, came west in command of the fourth corps area men.

S. Caughman is camp commander at Tulelake CCC camp.

Men at Camp Lava Beds are hard put to keep warm this week with the coal supply at the camp exhausted four days ago. A new shipment from Utah has failed to arrive and all hands in camp are recruited to furnish wood for heating and cooking. Captain Bailey stated that 30 cords of wood per month would be needed to keep the camp stoves in running order.

SPORTSMEN HOLD MEET AT REDDING

TULELAKE—Changes in the hunting dates on migratory water fowl, on hunting hours and on hours for hunting Chinese pheasants were among questions raised at a meeting of the Northern Council of Conservation clubs held Sunday at Redding, attended by delegates from sportsmen's associations from many sections of the northern part of the state.

Tulelake was represented by Charles K. Wiese, president of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Sportsman's association; Charles Coates, newly elected secretary, and Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Fairchild of the biological survey.

Representatives from Chico and Willows sought a later hunting season, suggesting November and December rather than October dates which were reported to be not satisfactory in that section.

Cross arguments brought out that lack of birds was not due entirely to the time of year but depended largely on weather conditions. The question was tabled for the present.

Still others, dissatisfied with hunting hours, sought a sunrise start instead of the 7 o'clock deadline. This recommended revision applied to pheasants as well as waterfowl. The question was held open for further consideration.

Fairchild gave a resume of the 1938 hunting season and Wiese spoke on Tulelake shooting hours and bag limits.

A report of the meeting will be presented to directors of the local association Wednesday night.
