

\$427 FOR FINN RELIEF TAKEN IN AT THEATRE

Sympathizers in the cause of the Finnish people attended the benefit show sponsored by the Finnish relief fund committee Tuesday evening at the Politan theatre. The showing of "Intermezzo" with the Swedish star, Ingrid Bergman, was especially well received as were the skits presented by the Gay Nineties orchestra, students of the Moldovan dance studio, and Swedish songs by Mrs. S. Meade Hader. Mrs. Carl Cook sang with the Gay Nineties orchestra.
