

SUDDEN HEART ATTACK TAKES CARL H. MASON

Carl Henry Mason, 44, died suddenly Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock at Hillside hospital where he was admitted a short time before, suffering from the effects of a heart attack.

Mr. Mason has made his home in Klamath Falls the past 19 years and was an outstanding and active member of the Lions club. He served as deputy district governor for three years and since the organization of the club was its secretary and a member of the board of directors.

While in his offices in the Medical-Dental building Wednesday morning, Mr. Mason suffered a severe heart attack. He had been in excellent health up to that time. He was sent to the hospital for a rest by his attending physician and there died suddenly.

Mr. Mason was an accountant and was well known both in Lakeview and Klamath Falls. He was a native of Finley, O., and at the time of his death was 44 years 4 months and 6 days old. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anna Mason, two young daughters, Shirley Anne and Mary Jane, all of this city; four brothers, Harry F. Wesley and Perry Mason of Salem, R. A. Mason of Dallas, Ore. He was a member of the Presbyterian church of this city.

Funeral arrangements will be made later by the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

High tribute was paid to Mr. Mason Thursday by members of the Lions club who felt deeply the passing of Mr. Mason. Mr. Mason served as auditor for Reames Golf and Country club and maintained business offices for the organization. He was also auditor for the Klamath county school district, audited the county books in Lake county and also various school districts in Lake county, and several irrigation districts.

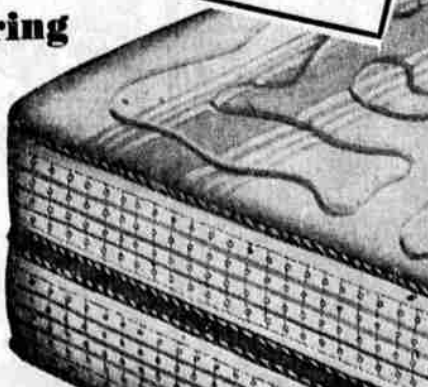

"Our Work for 1940" is the discussion subject of farm program leaders of Oregon counties at a series of seven district conferences being held at Redmond, Arlington, Grants Pass, Gresham, La Grande, Corvallis and Burns.
