PERCY ELECTED HEAD OF KENNEL CLUB FOR YEAR

At the annual meeting held on January 10, officers and directors of the Klamath Kennel club and Humane society were elected and a report was heard of the society's work caring for lost, hurt or starving animals.

S. W. Percy was again elected to the office of president; Fred Fleet, first vice president; Sam Lockwood, second vice president; Mrs. M. J. Young, secretary and treasurer; and the directors are Harold Merryman, Mrs. Robert Odell, Mrs. George Walton, Mrs. H. D. Mortenson, Mrs. Nelson Reed, Forrest C. Loebe and Mrs. D. J. Rees.

Plans are being made for a membership campaign to be conducted in the near future as a step in raising funds to construct a new and more adequate shelter, needed at the kennels. It was announced by the officers.

The annual report showed that 691 dogs and 430 cats were handled by the society this past year. Although the society receives only a portion of the license fees collected on city dogs, its work extends into the county whenever hurt or starving animals are reported as needing care. As a result 245 county dogs and 163 county cats received care. A total of 130 investigations were made by R. O. Fredericks who is in charge of the kennels.

Other animals handled by the society included one horse which was redeemed, a swan that was placed in the park, a calf, two pigeons and a rabbit, all placed; two porcupines, released; a heron and pelican, both of which died.

The present kennel club and humane society was organized in 1935, with George Kincaid elected the first president, and both he and Mrs. Kincaid worked hard to get the kennels in operation. The society has gradually grown in size and scope and, as reported at the last meeting, is debt free.
