

SALLA ATTACK BROKEN UP BY COLD, LOSSES

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Salla sector during the past few days.

"The enemy has been pushed back from Jouteljärvi to Markajärvi, for possession of which fighting is proceeding."

The Russian drive westward in the Salla sector was the most direct of several aimed ultimately at cutting approximately 200 miles across Finland to capture Tornio, a railroad at the head of the Gulf of Bothnia.

By doing this the Russians believe they could cut Finland's overland supply route from Sweden.

The communists also reported Finnish successes yesterday in repulsing "all enemy attacks" northeast of Lake Ladoga, south of the Salla front.

"Several strong enemy patrols were 'wiped out' by the Finns," stated.

Small detachments of Russian bombers attacked Hanko and Turku, southwestern Finnish cities, the communists said, as well as Lappeenya and Kolviato on the fighting fronts. Two persons were reported killed at Lappeenya, and four wounded.

MOSCOW, Jan. 18 (AP)—Soviet Russia today claimed a major victory over the Finnish air force—destruction of 11 planes in combat.

The Leningrad military headquarters communique covering yesterday's operations noted scouting and minor artillery and rifle fire in some war sectors and added:

"Soviet aviation made reconnoitering flights and bombed several railway junctions and military objectives. Eleven enemy airplanes downed in air combat."

The attention of foreigners also was drawn to Russian denials of published reports on the war with Finland and Russian-Rumanian relations. In connection with the war reports, the Leningrad command denied Russian planes ever had bombed Helsinki.

A snowstorm which had raged over Wyoming since yesterday was abating in temperatures which reached -22 at Cody, Butte, Mont., reported 31 below and in northwestern Oklahoma it was snowing hard, with drifts blocking some highways.

Some rural schools were closed in Minnesota, where readings of -17 at Winona, -20 at Austin and -23 at Rochester established all season lows. Iowans chattered in temperatures like 24 below at Rockwell City and 18 below at Des Moines. An official 30 below was registered at Bloomfield, Neb.

Other typical readings in the ice belt were: 18 below at Maryville, Mo.; 17 below at La Porte, Ind.; 2 below at Indianapolis; 15 below at Milwaukee and 27 below at Park Falls, Wis., in the north Woods; and 11 below at Kansas City.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18 (AP)—A combination of fog and polar air gave the bay area its coldest January 18 in 13 years.

Thomas Reed, U. S. meteorologist, said today. Today's minimum reading of 38 degrees was the lowest January 18 recording since 1922.

Reed said a vast blanket of fog filled the state's great valley from Redding in the Sacramento valley as far south as Bakersfield in the lower San Joaquin valley.

The fog was responsible for lower daytime temperature. Reed said, but prevented damaging drops in the mercury at night in the agricultural areas.

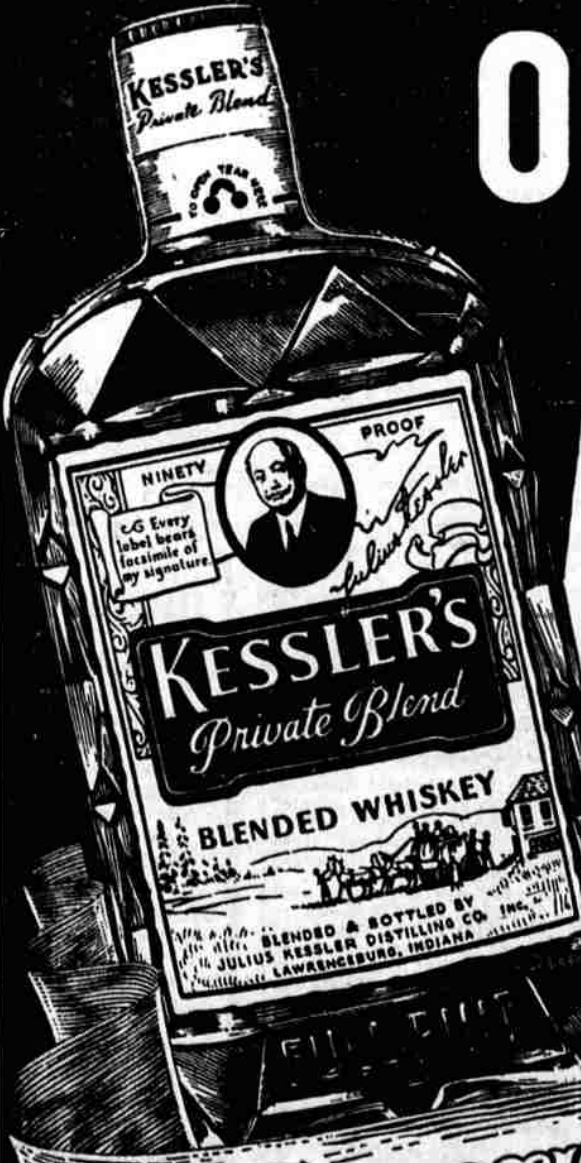
