It was reported that two other youths had been pulled from the lake water after breaking through the ice Thursday evening.

The lake is about 10 feet deep at the point where Colvin and Ray drowned.

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schedule. A reading of minus 10 at Jamestown was the coldest in 10 years. An ice jam in the Niagara river curtailed 60 per cent of the flow of the American falls. In Michigan the temperature dropped as far as 20 below zero at Jackson. Ohio readings ranged from 20 below at Greenville to 10 below at Youngstown. The weather was generally clear.

Sub-zero readings were reported from every section of Kentucky—18 below at Owensboro in the west, 14 below at Louisville and from 12 to 16 below around the Cincinnati area, where the Ohio river was frozen from bank to bank.

A light snow covered most of Virginia, created by temperatures which ranged from zero in the upper Shenandoah valley to 20 above at Danville in the extreme south.

Maryland temperatures dropped sharply last night, reaching 13 below at Big Savage in the western mountains, but they were moderating today.

There was light snow in southern New England, where ground temperatures ranged down to 17 below.

Overheard in a crowded elevator which had just stopped to let a nicely dressed, attractive girl off at the fifth floor: "Well, I guess everybody she knows gave her something amply for Christmas—and she feels she has to put on a little dab of each every morning."

A man said it. And his small audience snickered.

His remark certainly didn't reflect any great spirit of New Year kindness, but even in a mellow post-holiday mood one couldn't help feeling that he was justified in making it.

It's a mistake, of course, to use heavily perfumed foundation cream, rouge, and lipstick unless they are in matching scent. No subtly lovely, really charming effect can be created by use of bath powder in one odor, perfume in another and makeup in still another.

Gardenia may suit you perfectly and be extremely nice by itself, but, combined with jasmine, a mixed bouquet and a spicy scent, it won't be so alluring.

TOILET WATER IS GOOD SUBSTITUTE

No matter how much you like the perfume you got for Christmas, don't apply it lavishly for general daytime wear or, for that matter, for evening either. Perfume, like rouge, is most effective when used sparingly.

If you feel that your favorite perfume is too heavy or too expensive for daytime, consider getting toilet water in matching odor. You can get a great deal more of it for the same money, and you don't have to worry much about using it too lavishly. Smart business women invariably use toilet water during the day, saving perfume, especially the heavier types, for after-office hours.

Sweden Bolsters Air Defenses as Soviet Apologizes
