Novelty Frankfurters Offer Old Favorite in New Guise

"FRANKLY speaking, there's something new under the sun—"dinnerize" frankfurters whose casings have been made more tender with pineapple juice. They appeared recently at a luncheon of gourmets in New York. This was the menu: gumbo soup, frankfurters, gastronomic, mixed greens salad and pumpkin pie with cheese. They are now on sale generally.

Frankfurters Gastronomic (Allow 2 frankfurters, dinner size, to each portion)

Bake the new pineapple-juiced frankfurters in the oven for 10 minutes. Serve on a mound of freshly made mashed potatoes. Pour over this sauce: use chicken gravy with a few sliced young onions sautéed in butter and add a dash of white wine or lemon juice. Serve sauerkraut in little side dishes.

You've probably tasted the other novelties in the frankfurter line. They are called "turkey-furters" and are made of turkey, veal and pork, packed inside sheep casing. Tender and mild

in flavor, tasting a little like smoked turkey, they will brighten your buffet parties. Serve

BREAKFAST: Tangerine sections, cracked wheat cereal, crisp bacon, toast, jelly, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Pineapple-juiced, chopped meat patties, rolls, baked apples, cookies, tea, milk.

DINNER: Grapefruit on half shell, dinnerize frankfurters, mashed potatoes, chicken gravy, sauerkraut, pumpkin pie, cheese, coffee, milk.

in rolls with cranberry sauce, taking the place of mustard.

And here's a simple variation on the hamburger theme.

Chopped Meat Patties (Serve 4)

One pound chuck steak, ground, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 4 thin slices salt pork.

Season chopped meat and mix in parsley. Form into 4 flat cakes. Wrap salt pork around each cake and tie with string. Get broiler very hot. Broil cakes for 5 minutes on each side. Serve with broiled bananas.
