WILD BIRDS IRK TULELAKE FARMERS

TULELAKE—Wild geese and ducks that feed on young grain and new seedlings of hay were under fire Wednesday night at a meeting of directors of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Sportsman's association, and members hope to come to some agreement with the biological survey in an effort to avert future depredations.

Guards to patrol areas where damage might be heaviest, was one method of control suggested and the association and biological officials will work out some system satisfactory to farmers in the near future. Dozens of complaints have circulated from areas where the birds feed, some reports being to the effect that young hay is picked into the ground, killing the crop.

Biological officials and officers of the association estimate that about twice the number of migratory waterfowl are in the basin this year that were here during the same period in 1939.

Charles K. Wiene, president of the association, and Charles Coates, secretary, gave detailed reports of the meeting of the Northern Council of Conservation clubs, attended last Sunday at Redding.

Roosevelt Advocates Public Forests As Social Project

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—Development of community-owned forests was advocated today by President Roosevelt as a method of producing timber and fuel supplies, reducing local taxes and providing additional playgrounds for the nation's children.

The chief executive's views were expressed in a foreword to a forest service publication telling of progress in establishing the community-forest idea.

"I am glad to endorse the forest service program to establish and maintain more community forests," wrote the president. "Community forests are an old and popularly accepted part of forest conservation. They have helped for many years to reduce local taxes by yielding profitable timber crops. They have also provided other benefits, such as watershed protection, outdoor recreation, shelter for bird and beast, and permanent jobs through the sustained production of cordwood, posts, telephone poles, railroad ties, Christmas trees, pulpwood, and logs for lumber."

"More of our communities could profit economically, socially, and spiritually by ownership and operation of their own forests close at home. Developments of such local forests would be an important step in the rebuilding of our national resources and would provide additional outdoor playgrounds for the children of America."

The forest service reported that

about 1500 American communities operated forestry projects involving a total of more than 3,000,000 acres. New York state led with nearly 600. The largest project in this country and probably the largest in the world was owned, the service said, by Seattle, Wash.

DAY TO QUIT AS JACKSON JUDGE

MEDFORD, Jan. 19 (AP)—Earl B. Day, county judge of Jackson county, in a long distance telephone call to the Medford Mail-Tribune from Baker, Ore., announced Thursday he would not be a candidate for the county judgeship in the May primary. No reason was given for the action, which came as a surprise. Judge Day is attending a meeting of county officials in Baker.

Judge Day was appointed to the judgeship in 1933, and in 1936 was elected to a four-year term. He is a former member of the legislature from Jackson county.
