League Has Report

Klamath Women Interested in Washington Act

Word has been received in Klamath Falls from the press department of the National League of Women Voters in Washington, D. C., that the league will swing into the new year and the new season of congress with a drive for re-enactment of the reciprocal trade agreements program. This is of particular interest to league members here who have watched action in Washington closely.

The league bases its stand on three main lines of argument: That trade agreements are a factor in national prosperity; that trade agreements are a contribution to world peace; and that trade agreements constitute a scientific method of tariff-making—thus filling a long felt need of this nation.

"Traditionally congress has passed tariffs by 'log-rolling' which means that each congressman, in order to get enough votes to protect his own local interest, has voted to protect the local interests of other congressmen," pointed out Miss Marguerite M. Wells, national president of the league. "Tariffs as a result have often been hodge podge. Some special interests have obtained increased 'protection' to the detriment of other special interests."

"The reciprocal trade program is a scientific method of tariff making. Under it, congress defines the broad basis for our trade policy, and leaves to qualified experts the formulation of detailed provisions of trade agreements."
