News Behind THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 — Mr. Hull's men are not bluffing. They are really going to let the trade agreement with Japan expire without any promises, understandings, or "modus vivendi's." Furthermore, they will not raise a murmur of protest if the senate makes the blow double by passing something like the Pittman resolution embargoing essential war materials.

This is a peculiar game, but not a new one. Essentially it is a diplomatic war of nerves, the same as practiced in Europe before they took to arms — not as rough yet, and not likely to lead to the same conclusion — but nevertheless determined.

Therefore, you may expect our relations with Japan will get worse, very much worse, before they get better.

CLEAR PURPOSE

The confusing game has a very clear purpose and aim. Primarily our statesmen seem encouraged to it by the prospects of limiting Japanese aggression in China. As this goal now seems to be just beyond the pot of gold in the rainbow, they will take less. What their efforts may work out to eventually, months hence, is an agreement by which Japan abandons her currency tricks practiced against our trade, reopening of the Yangtze valley, and some honest basis of understanding.

NO EFFECTS

Termination of the trade treaty due this coming Friday is not expected to have very far-reaching commercial repercussions. The state department is leaving the way open to clamp down restrictions but is likely to use this right only as a defensive weapon. The 300 to 350 Japanese merchants in the United States will probably be switched to a six-months permit basis, but there will be no trouble about their continuance in business here. If they were excluded, you can imagine what Japan would do to Americans who are doing a much larger business there.

SOME GOOD

No hats were thrown in the air here over the new Japanese cabinet. Installation of a naval regime is considered favorable, because it puts a mild damper on the objectionable military faction. The best that can be said here for the change is that it does as much good as could be expected, which is not very much.

HANDS FULL

Hints have been coming out of Tokyo and Shanghai that the British are acting as if they might dig in under us in this far eastern situation. No confirmation of the suggestion is available here. The British did that in 1931, but their situation is a little different today. They have their hands full elsewhere.

WINDFALL

Mr. Roosevelt does not know how he will get the \$700,000,000 windfall upon which he predicted his budget — or will not tell.

Curious Senator Byrd of Virginia sent a letter to the White House asking how this basic fact of the budget is to be performed. He has now received a reply from Budget Director Smith saying in effect the executive department has no information it can submit on that subject yet.

If the president and the budget director do not know how it is to be done, that makes it unanimous. At the time Mr. Roosevelt offered the budget, his associates explained privately they expected to recapture capital invested in the reconstruction finance corporation and the farm credit administration for most of this sum. SIDE GLANCES

Intermediate credit and central bank funds were supposed to furnish large amounts, but the bookkeeping on this phase is so complicated that no one here seems able to find out how these capital investments of the government stand. For instance, Mr. Roosevelt will not be able to get any money from the Home Owners' Loan corporation because a \$66,000,000 impairment of capital is known to exist there.

For months Byrd has been studying the statistics of these government investments, and the other day, when he was near completion of his long survey, he found that the figures given him were based on book value rather than actual values.

The conclusion seems warranted that Mr. Roosevelt merely stuck this \$700,000,000 windfall into the budget calculations from scrap paper notes of his activities. When it comes time to take the windfall, the amount may be more or less — more than likely much less.

Britain Decides Finland Can Win War With Help

LONDON, Jan. 22 (AP)—Given 30,000 more fighting men, 200 airplanes and a generous supply of military equipment before May, Finland can save herself from soviet Russia, British military authorities concluded today.

In line with a growing belief that Finland is the pivot of the entire struggle against what Britons call "aggression in Europe," Great Britain and France have been making substantial contributions to Finland, including planes and military supplies, but the amounts have been kept secret.

The military experts' prediction was founded on close study of the campaign in northern Finland, where they said one of history's most notable displays of tactical skill had thrown back the Russian invaders.

It was agreed generally that May would bring the ultimate turning point. It is then that the snows melt and the ground becomes firm enough for best use of the soviet mechanical equipment.

TEACHERS HEAR TALK ON NAZIS BY DEAN ALLEN

Conditions affecting the youth of Germany and the need for an open mind in understanding their problems was discussed in the principal talk before the Klamath county unit of the Oregon State Teachers' association Saturday morning by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism, University of Oregon.

Dean Allen, who spent a year in Germany recently on a fellowship, told of his personal contact with educators and other individuals in Germany and the effect of the Nazi regime on the young people of the nation.

The speaker, whose wide knowledge of world affairs made the talk extremely enlightening to his listeners, stressed the importance of keeping an open mind in regard to the conditions which exist in Germany. He said the people of other nations must live in the future with the Germans and must make peace with them, and should not shut their eyes to the problems confronting the younger generation of the German race.

The teachers association also heard a report from delegates to the recent state teachers association meeting. The delegates were Miss Lillie Darby, city music supervisor; Miss Lucille Hoagland, Sprague River; Carl Muender, Roosevelt school; Ruth Houser, Riverside school; A. C. Olson, Altamont school, and Myron Wheeler, Bonanza.

Bostonians See Pair of Suns; Solon Explains

BOSTON, Jan. 22 (UP)—Two suns were seen over Boston Saturday.

Citizens who thought they were seeing double, or feared another sun had suddenly awoken into the heavens, were assured by Harvard meteorologists that the phenomenon while unusual, has occurred 20 or 30 times in the last half century.

Prof. Charles F. Brooks, director of the Harvard Meteorological observatory said the extra sun was a parheliion, or mock sun resulting when the sun's rays struck snow crystals which had formed at an altitude of one or two miles and were reflected. The result was a mock sun in the northeastern sky for about 20 minutes.

Prof. Brooks said that a parheliion usually appears 22 or 23 degrees from the sun, but this — which resembled a silver disc — was 120 degrees away, an unparalleled distance in his 35 years experience.

The Family Doctor

GOUT has been called the "rich man's disease." It usually occurs in middle-aged men who are overweight. For a while it was thought that gout had practically disappeared, but now we know that cases occur and are likely to be overlooked because they are confused with various forms of arthritis.

Gout usually affects the joints of the big toe, but it may also occur in the knee joints and other joints of the toes.

When a gout patient's blood is examined, a large amount of uric acid is found in the blood, and occasionally there are concretions in the ears. These are small round collections of chalky material, deposited on the outer margin of the ear. Since it is possible to increase the uric acid in the blood by eating large amounts of fat, it is important to make certain that the uric acid increase is not due to such a cause.

The modern treatment of gout particularly involves control of the diet. In the diet for gout, so-called purine substances are reduced to a minimum. Thus the diet in gout includes small quantities of milk (preferably skimmed), cereals with milk, white bread with a minimum amount of butter, fresh fruits with large quantities of water, lemonade, and fruit juices.

The food must be free from purine substances and low in fat. But it should be easily digestible and relatively small in quantities. This will enable the overweight person to reduce at the same time that he helps to control the symptoms of the gout.

In order to avoid substances that are rich in purines, it is preferable for the person with gout to avoid meat, broths, meat soups, sweetbreads, livers, kidneys, fowl, fish, oysters, and similar substances. This will help also to keep down the amount of fat.

Fortunately there are drugs which the doctor can give to control pain in gout and to hasten excretion of uric acid. These drugs however, are toxic in character. They should never be taken except under the control of the doctor who will regulate the amount to prevent injury to the organs.

Some people are particularly sensitive to the drug called cinchophen and respond to its use with inflammatory changes in the liver. The physician who administers this drug can be aware of the dangers and do what is necessary to alleviate them.

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
